- Minimum Unit Requirements:** Any course that appears on a curriculum guide and the General Education Pattern (Plan A) may fulfill both major and general education requirements (Approved by College Curriculum Committee Spring 2012). For this degree, complete a minimum of 60 units in courses numbered 1-599. Please note that additional elective units may be required to meet this minimum based upon courses selected to fulfill General Education for the Associate Degree.

- Scholarship:** Maintain an **overall grade point average (GPA) of 2.0** ("C" average) based on all accredited college work applied to the degree, no matter where completed. For this **field of concentration, complete each course above with a grade of "C" or better**, or "P" if course graded on a P/NP basis.
- Residence for the Degree:** Complete at least 12 semester units of the required 60 semester units in residence at Long Beach City College in order for the college to grant an Associate of Arts and/or an Associate of Science Degree.
- Residence for the Field of Concentration:** Complete fifty percent (50%) or more of the unit requirements for this field of concentration in residence; this means at **least 20 units** of the required 40 must be **completed at Long Beach City College**. Credit earned by exam, where applicable, may be included.
- General Education and Proficiency Requirements:** Complete the required A.A./A.S. General Education and Proficiency requirements*, otherwise known as "Plan A". For Plan A requirements, refer to the general catalog or view it online at <http://osca.lbcc.edu>.

For graduation with an Human Services – Addiction Studies **Certificate of Achievement**:

- Complete each of the **REQUIRED COURSES** listed above with a **minimum grade of "C"**.
- Complete fifty percent (50%) or more of the unit requirements for this field of concentration in residence; this means at **least 20 units** of the required 40 units must be **completed at Long Beach City College**. Credit earned by exam, where applicable, may be included.
- Complete and submit the certificate application form to the Admissions and Records office during your final semester of course work. Career Opportunities

Students learn the skills and knowledge necessary to transfer to upper-division programs in social work or human services and be eligible to become employed at the paraprofessional entry level in serving alcohol and drugs.

This **Certificate of Achievement** will prepare students for an entry-level position in the alcohol/drug treatment field. This certificate fulfills the California Association of Alcohol & Drug Studies (CAADE) and the California Association of Alcohol & Drug Studies Abuse Counselors (CAADAC) academic and work experience requirements. Additional work experience plus passing their test will lead students to becoming Certified Addiction Treatment Counselor (CATC).

This **Associate Degree** will prepare students for an entry-level position in the human services/alcohol and drug treatment field and for career advancement for those already employed in these occupations.

This **Certificate of Accomplishment (Co Occurring Disorder)** will prepare students for work with specialized population of AOD clients.

Program Mission and Outcomes

This Associate Degree in Human Services Addiction Studies will prepare students for an entry-level position in the addiction treatment and recovery field. Completing the coursework for this program will prepare students for certification as a Certified Addiction Treatment Counselor (CATC). The Program is accredited by the California Alcohol and Drug Education (CAADE). Students interested in state-level certification will need to pass a state examination. The program's coursework can also assist career advancement for those already employed in occupations related to addiction counseling and treatments. Students may also learn the skills and knowledge necessary to transfer to upper division programs in social work, psychology, or human services.

Successful Human Services Studies program completion requires that students understand and abide by the state requirements in holding and updating valid clinical credentials and certificates while seeing clients.

Program Student Learning Outcomes:

- Demonstrate the ability to attain the Institutional Student Learning Outcomes (ISLOs).
- Develop a psychosocial treatment plan for a client.
- Synthesize the theories and principles of drug and alcohol clinical evaluation, treatment planning, referral, service coordination, counseling, documentation, and professional/ethical responsibilities.

Outcomes (Alcohol and Chemical Dependency Certificate of Accomplishment):

- Demonstrate knowledge of history of abuse of alcohol and other mood altering substance and examine how people develop the ability to abuse and become addicted to drugs as well as other behavior, apply the psychological, social and physical contributions to addiction, understand the applications of treatment and intervention for drug use disorder, understand the cultural factors in drug use and chemical dependency, learn to examine drug related disorders and social factors with a scientific and data and empirical evidence based theoretical approaches. This program will assist students in preparation for the California Association of Alcohol/Drug Educators (CAADE) and/or California Association of Alcohol and Drug Abuse Counselors (CAADAC) certification tests.

Outcomes (Alcohol and Chemical Dependency Certificate of Accomplishment):

- Students demonstrate ability to identify symptoms of co-occurring disorders, develop appropriate treatment planning and caseload management, engage in relapse prevention and symptoms management
