


HUMAN SERVICES: ALCOHOL & DRUG STUDIES

Curriculum Guide for Academic Year 2011-2012

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Students planning to **transfer** to a four-year college or university should refer to the ASSIST web site at <u>www.assist.org</u> and **consult a counselor** before beginning a program of study. To meet with a counselor call 562-938-4561 for the LAC, or (562) 938-3920 for PCC. Students may also wish to visit the Transfer Center on either campus.



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Associate Degree requirements continued from the previous page:

- 1. Scholarship: Maintain an overall grade point average (GPA) of 2.0 ("C" average) based on all accredited college work applied to the degree, no matter where completed. For this field of concentration, complete each course above with a grade of "C" or better, or "P" if course is graded on a P/NP basis.
- Residence for the Degree: Complete at least 30 units of the required 60 in residence at LBCC, or complete in 2. residence at LBCC at least 20 units within the last 30 units of work applied to the degree.
- Residence for the Field of Concentration: Complete fifty percent (50%) or more of the unit requirements for this field of 3. concentration in residence; this means at least 12 - 13 units of the required 24 - 25 must be completed at Long Beach **City College.** Credit earned by exam, where applicable, may be included.
- General Education and Proficiency Requirements: Complete the required A.A./A.S. General Education and 4. Proficiency requirements*, otherwise known as "Plan A". For Plan A requirements, refer to the general catalog or view it online at http://osca.lbcc.edu .
- Complete and submit the degree application form to the Admissions and Records office during your final semester of 5. course work. These forms are available in the Admissions and Records office, or online at http://admissions.lbcc.edu/ Refer to the Schedule of Classes (http://schedule.lbcc.edu) and click the "Important Dates" link to view the actual deadline for each semester.

*The requirements for general education/proficiency and the field of concentration (major) need to be from the same catalog year. This catalog year may be any year between the year of initial enrollment to the present, provided continuous enrollment is maintained throughout. See the catalog for definition of "continuous enrollment".

Unless otherwise noted, "double-counting" is not allowed. That is, one course may not be used to fulfill both a field of concentration requirement and to fulfill a general education requirement.



For graduation with a **Certificate of Accomplishment**:

- 1. Complete each of the **REQUIRED COURSES** listed above with a **minimum grade of "C"**, or better, or "P" if course is graded on a P/NP basis.
- 2. Fifty percent (50%) or more of the required units must be completed in residence at LBCC.
- 3. Students must complete courses within 3 years.
- Complete and submit the certificate application form to the Admissions and Records office during your final semester of course work. These forms are available in the Admissions and Records office, or online at http://admissions.lbcc.edu/.

Career Opportunities

Students learn the skills and knowledge necessary to transfer to upper-division programs in social work or human services and be eligible to become employed at the paraprofessional entry level in serving alcohol and drug clients.

This **Certificate of Achievement** will prepare students for an entry-level position in the alcohol/drug treatment field. This certificate fulfills the California Association of Alcohol & Drug Studies (CAADE) and the California Association of Alcohol & Drug Studies Abuse Counselors (CAADAC) academic and work experience requirements. Additional work experience plus passing their test will lead students to becoming Certified Addiction Treatment Counselor (CATC).

This **Associate Degree** will prepare students for an entry-level position in the human services/alcohol and drug treatment field and for career advancement for those already employed in these occupations.

This Certificate of Accomplishment (Co Occurring Disorder) will prepare students for work with specialized population of AOD clients.

Program Mission and Outcomes

Fulfillment of state approved certification requirements of California for job placement and workforce development.

Outcomes:

- Develop a psychosocial treatment plan for a client.
- Synthesize the theories and principles of drug and alcohol clinical evaluation, treatment planning, referral, service coordination, counseling, documentation, and professional/ethical responsibilities.
