Program Admission Requirements

General Information Items

- 1. Graduation from an accredited high school or equivalent (GED) is required.
- 2. Science courses taken prior to acceptance of application must have been completed within the past 5 years.
- 3. This program is not for Licensed Vocational Nurses. LVNs should apply for one of the advanced placement programs.
- 4. An overall GPA of 2.5 is required in the science courses for acceptance into the program. A student who is on academic or progress probation must meet with the program director to be considered for acceptance into the program.
- 5. Program information meetings are held on a regular basis. Call (562) 938-4166 for dates and times.

Sequential Procedure for Application to the Program

- 1. Must see a counselor to develop an educational plan and for evaluation of previous courses and proficiencies.
- 2. Complete mathematics proficiency to meet current graduation requirements. Proper documentation must be submitted with application to the School of Health and Science.
- Complete reading proficiency to meet current graduation requirements through LBCC assessment testing or completion of READ 82 or 83 with a grade of "C" or higher. Proper documentation must be submitted with application to the School of Health and Science.
- 4. Complete information competency to meet current graduation requirements or the computer proficiency. To see a list of appropriate courses check the most current LBCC General Education Plan. Proper documentation must be submitted with application to the School of Health and Science.
- 5. Maintain an overall grade point average of 2.5 or higher for all courses. An overall grade point average of 2.5 or higher is required in the science courses. Proper documentation must be submitted with application to the School of Health and Science.
- 6. Proof of high school graduation or equivalency must be submitted with application to the School of Health and Science (high school/college transcript, diploma, GED).
- 7. An official copy of complete transcripts from all other colleges attended must be included with the application to the School of Health and Science.
- 8. Apply for the program during the open application period.
 - a. Complete the Registered Nursing Program Application form. Forms are available in the "C" Building at the School of Health and Science, C100C.
 - b. Please bring completed application form with a self-addressed, stamped, and legal size envelope (4 1/8" X 9 ½" available in the Bookstore) to the School of Health and Science Building "C". DO NOT SEAL! If you wish, you may mail your application to the School of Health and Science Office, including a self-addressed, stamped, legal size envelope. IF ANY PART OF THE APPLICATION IS INCOMPLETE, YOU WILL NOT BE CONSIDERED FOR THE PROGRAM.
- All applicants will be evaluated according to overall GPA and GPA of Biological Science courses. It is the student's responsibility to provide the admissions clerk with his/her grades for all courses completed and updated GPA during each application.
- 10. Those applicants who satisfy the requirements will be invited to an Advisement Session that they MUST attend. ONLY those applicants who are qualified and who have attended an Advisement Session (different from an Information Session) will be considered for admission into the program. Effective Spring 2009 this admission will be provisional contingent upon score on TEAS examination.

- 11. A social security card is required by the California Board of Nursing in order to take the NCLEX. In addition, a social security card is required by some clinical agencies. Inability to provide proof of social security card may jeopardize a student from completing clinical requirements.
- 12. All required science courses must be less than 5 years old.

NOTE: IT IS YOUR RESPONSIBILITY TO PROVIDE YOUR CURRENT ADDRESS AND TELEPHONE NUMBER. Acceptance into the program

- Effective Spring 2011 all applicants will be required to take the TEAS 5.0 examination and score a minimum score of 62. It is your responsibility to notify staff if you need special accommodations prior to testing.
- Once you have been officially admitted into the program you must attend a second required advisement session. At this session additional information will be given to you on registration, uniforms, etc.
- You must submit evidence of physical and emotional fitness. A health evaluation form will be provided at the advisement 3. session.
- You must meet agency requirements for background clearance, immunizations, TB clearance, CPR certification for Health 4. Care Providers, and malpractice insurance. These must be kept current during the program.
- Non-citizen students must show a valid Resident Alien Card or International Student Visa/F1 Visa.
- 6. Strong command of the English language, both verbal and written, is essential for successful completion of the program.

Minimum Unit Requirements: §Any course that appears on a curriculum guide and the General Education Pattern (Plan A) may fulfill both major and general education requirements (Approved by College Curriculum Committee Spring 2012). For this degree, complete a minimum of 60 units in courses numbered 1-599. Please note that additional elective units may be required to meet this minimum based upon courses selected to fulfill General Education for the Associate Degree.

- 2. Scholarship: Maintain an overall grade point average (GPA) of 2.0 ("C" average) based on all accredited college work applied to the degree, no matter where completed. For this field of concentration, complete each course above with a grade of "C" or better, or "P" if course is graded on a P/NP basis.
- Residence for the Degree: Complete at least 30 units of the required 60 in residence at LBCC, or complete in residence at LBCC at least 20 units within the last 30 units of work applied to the degree.
- Residence for the Field of Concentration: Complete fifty percent (50%) or more of the unit requirements for this field of concentration in residence; this means at least 34 units of the required 68 must be completed at Long Beach City College. Credit earned by exam, where applicable, may be included
- 5. General Education and Proficiency Requirements: Complete the required A.A./A.S. General Education and Proficiency requirements*, otherwise known as "Plan A". For Plan A requirements, refer to the general catalog or view it online at http://osca.lbcc.edu.
- Complete and submit the degree application form to the Admissions and Records office during your final semester of course work. These forms are available in the Admissions and Records office, or online at http://admissions.lbcc.edu/ Refer to the Schedule of Classes (http://schedule.lbcc.edu) and click the "Important Dates" link to view the actual deadline for each semester.

*The requirements for general education/proficiency and the field of concentration (major) need to be from the same catalog year. This catalog year may be any year between the year of initial enrollment to the present, provided continuous enrollment is maintained throughout. Career Opportunities

The program is designed to be completed in two years (after completion of pre-requisites) and qualifies the student to take the NCLEX-RN licensing examination given by the State of California Board of Registered Nursing. The program satisfies the requirements for an Associate degree and/or a Career Certificate. The graduate is qualified for immediate employment in acute care hospitals and many other health care facilities.

This **Associate Degree** and **Certificate of Achievement** prepare students for an entry-level position in a variety of health care settings following successful completion of the NCLEX-RN. The ADN also serves as a foundation for specialization.

Graduates of the Associate Degree Nursing Program are also eligible to transfer into the upper-division nursing courses in ADN to bachelor's degree nursing programs and ADN to master's degree nursing programs.

RESTRICTIONS ON LICENSURE

Persons with substance abuse problems or with conviction of crimes substantially related to the practice of nursing may not be granted a license by the California Board of Registered Nursing. ACCREDITATION

Long Beach City College is fully accredited by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges. The nursing program is accredited by the National League for Nursing Accrediting Commission, 3343 Peachtree RD. NE Suite 500, Atlanta, GA 30326 and the State of California Board of Registered Nursing.

Students must complete the courses outlined on the curriculum guide for the year in which they take their first nursing course. Students who withdraw from the program will be obligated by the guide and the nursing student handbook of the year of their reentry into the program.

Every nursing course in the program has a challenge option provided for students enrolled in the course. Students are directed to the individual course syllabus for detailed instructions on how to apply for advanced placement via the challenge option.

Estimated Expenses

Current enrollment fees are \$26 per unit.

Students purchase their own books, school supplies, uniforms and pay a student-body fee. The college has no dormitory facilities; students must provide for own living expenses and transportation. Limited educational grants and loan funds are available.

Transfer Credit

Applicants who wish to transfer from another school of nursing must meet the entrance requirements and spend at least 2 semesters in the Long Beach City College Program. Eligibility for transfer credit, advanced placement, and/or credit by examination is determined on an individual basis by the Program Director. Applicants may attend an information session for additional information regarding transfer into the RN Program.
