For graduation with an Associate in Arts (A.A.) Degree with a major in Administration of Justice:

 Minimum Unit Requirements: <u>SAny course that appears on a curriculum guide and the General Education Pattern (Plan A) may fulfill both major and general education requirements (Approved by College Curriculum Committee Spring 2012).</u> For this degree, complete a minimum of 60 units in courses numbered 1-599. Please note that additional elective units may be required to meet this minimum based upon courses selected to fulfill General Education for the Associate Degree.

Administration of Justice Major:	24 units
General Education/A.A.§	25 units
Minimum Total Units	60 units

- Scholarship: Maintain an overall grade point average (GPA) of 2.0 ("C" average) based on all accredited college work applied to the degree, no matter where completed. For this field of concentration, complete each course above with a grade of "C" or better, or "P" if course is graded on a P/NP basis.
- 3. **Residence for the Degree:** Complete at least 30 units of the required 60 in residence at LBCC, or complete in residence at LBCC at least 20 units within the last 30 units of work applied to the degree.
- Residence for the Field of Concentration: Complete fifty percent (50%) or more of the unit requirements for this field of concentration in residence; this means at least 12 units of the required 24 must be completed at Long Beach City College. Credit earned by exam, where applicable, may be included.
- General Education and Proficiency Requirements: Complete the required A.A./A.S. General Education and Proficiency requirements*, otherwise known as "Plan A". For Plan A requirements, refer to the general catalog or view it online at <u>http://osca.lbcc.edu</u>.
- Complete and submit the degree application form to the Admissions and Records office during your final semester of course work. These forms are available in the Admissions and Records office, or online at http://admissions.lbcc.edu/. Refer to the Schedule of Classes (http://schedule.lbcc.edu) and click the "Important Dates" link to view the actual deadline for each semester.

*The requirements for general education/proficiency and the field of concentration (major) need to be from the same catalog year. This catalog year may be any year between the year of initial enrollment to the present, provided continuous enrollment is maintained throughout. See the catalog for definition of "continuous enrollment".

Career Opportunities

Students are prepared for entry-level employment in the criminal justice system. Technical education courses prepare students in the concept sand methodologies of the disciplines. This program also provides partial lower division preparation for the baccalaureate degree in this field.

This **Certificate of Achievement** will prepare students for an entry-level position in a variety of entry level employment opportunities within the criminal justice system such as Law Enforcement, Corrections, and the Courts.

This **Associate Degree** will prepare students for career advancements in Law Enforcement, Corrections, and the Courts. Appropriate course selection will also facilitate transfer in a related major.

Program Mission and Outcomes

The Administration of Justice program at Long Beach City College is a comprehensive offering of courses created and designed for the purpose of educating and training diverse groups of students who aspire for careers in the Criminal Justice System. The program provides both certificates of completion and degrees that reflect our student's level of educational preparedness for entry level opportunities in Law Enforcement, Corrections, and the Courts. Students are expected to successfully develop college level skills and knowledge in furtherance of transferring to other four year institutions of higher learning and successful careers in Criminal Justice.

Outcomes:

- Explore the history, development, structure and functions of the American criminal justice system.
- Apply criminological/criminal justice theories, principles, and concepts to address real-life situations in the field.
- Recognize the importance and practice of legal and ethical behavior in a professional criminal justice work setting.
- Analyze, interpret, and evaluate criminological/criminal justice theories, policies, practices and procedures to develop strategies to control and prevent crime.
