

NURSING: ASSOCIATE DEGREE (RN) PROGRAM

Curriculum Guide for Academic Year 2017-2018

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Students planning to **transfer** to a four-year college or university should refer to the ASSIST web site at www.assist.org and **consult a counselor** before beginning a program of study. Please call 562-938-4561 for the LAC, or 562-938-3920 for PCC to schedule a meeting with a counselor. Students may also wish to visit the Transfer Center on either campus.

Program Admission Requirements

General Information Items:

1. All applicants must have a clear background as unclear backgrounds may prevent the student from completing clinical requirements and jeopardize licensure.
2. All applicants should be physically and emotionally fit. If selected, applicant will need to show proof of meeting this requirement.
3. A strong command of the English language, both written and verbal is essential for successful completion of the program.
4. All applicants must show proof of a Social Security Number as a Social Security Number is required by some clinical agencies. In addition, the California Board of Registered Nurses requires a Social Security or individual taxpayer identification number in order to take the NCLEX-RN exam.
5. All applicants must have a LBCC student ID number.
6. All applicants must show proof of high school graduation or equivalency in the form of a diploma, transcripts or GED.
7. Meeting minimum requirements does not guarantee admission to the nursing program.

Sequential Procedure for Application to the Program:

1. Attend a mandatory information session. Information sessions are held on a regular basis throughout the fall and spring semester. Dates and times are listed on the nursing website: <http://nursing.lbcc.edu>.
2. All applicants must meet with a counselor to develop an educational plan and for evaluation of previous courses and proficiencies.
3. Complete the Reading Proficiency requirement for graduation through the LBCC assessment testing or completion of READ 82 or 83 with a grade of "C" or higher. Proper documentation must be submitted with application.
4. Complete the Mathematics Proficiency requirement for graduation through the LBCC assessment testing or completion of MATH 120, 130 or 130A with a grade of "C" or higher. Proper documentation must be submitted with application.
5. Complete the information and technology portion of the Information Competency requirement with a grade of "C" or higher. This requirement is recommended for application and required for graduation from the nursing program.
6. Complete ENGL 1 with a grade of "C" or higher.
7. Applicants must have a minimal overall GPA of 2.5 or higher.
8. Applicants must have a minimal GPA of 2.5 or higher in these science courses: Human Anatomy, Human Physiology and Microbiology. These science courses must be completed with a grade of "C" or higher within 5 years of applying to the program.
9. Official transcripts for all non-LBCC coursework and unofficial transcripts for LBCC coursework must be submitted with the application.
10. Print, Complete and sign the application found on the nursing website: <http://nursing.lbcc.edu>.
11. Meet with a counselor to have your application signed.
12. Submit self-addressed stamped envelope with your application and all required documents.
13. Incomplete applications will NOT be considered.

NOTE: IT IS YOUR RESPONSIBILITY TO PROVIDE YOUR CURRENT ADDRESS AND TELEPHONE NUMBER.

Acceptance into the program:

1. All selected applicants and alternates are required to attend a mandatory first Advisement Meeting to discuss requirements such as the TEAS test, background clearance, immunizations, TB testing, CPR certification and malpractice insurance.
2. All applicants will be required to take the ATI TEAS examination and achieve a minimum score of 62. It is the responsibility of the student to notify staff if special accommodations are needed **prior** to testing.
3. Attendance at a second required advisement session to prepare for the first courses of the nursing program is required.
4. You must submit evidence of physical and emotional fitness. A health evaluation form will be provided at the advisement session.

For graduation with an **A. A. or A.S. Degree with a major in Nursing: Associate Degree (RN) Program**

- Minimum Unit Requirements:** Any course that appears on a curriculum guide and the General Education Pattern (Plan A) may fulfill both major and general education requirements (Approved by College Curriculum Committee Spring 2012). For this degree, complete a minimum of 60 units in courses numbered 1-599. Please note that additional **elective units** may be required to meet this minimum based upon courses selected to fulfill General Education for the Associate Degree.

Nursing: Associate Degree (RN) Program Major: 67.5 units
General Education/A.S § 19.0 units

- Scholarship:** Maintain an **overall grade point average (GPA) of 2.0** ("C" average) based on all accredited college work applied to the degree, no matter where completed. For this **field of concentration, complete each course above with a grade of "C" or better**, or "P" if course is graded on a P/NP basis.
- Residence for the Degree:** Complete at least 12 semester units of the required 60 semester units in residence at Long Beach City College in order for the college to grant an Associate of Arts and/or an Associate of Science Degree.
- Residence for the Field of Concentration:** Complete fifty percent (50%) or more of the unit requirements for this field of concentration in residence; this means at **least 34 units** of the required 67.5 must be **completed at Long Beach City College**. Credit earned by exam, where applicable, may be included
- General Education and Proficiency Requirements:** Complete the required A.A./A.S. General Education and Proficiency requirements*, otherwise known as "Plan A". For Plan A requirements, refer to the general catalog or view it online at <http://osca.lbcc.edu>.
- Complete and submit the degree application form to the Admissions and Records office during your final semester of course work. These forms are available in the Admissions and Records office, or online at <http://admissions.lbcc.edu/>. Refer to the Schedule of Classes (<http://schedule.lbcc.edu>) and click the "Important Dates" link to view the actual deadline for each semester.

*The requirements for general education/proficiency and the field of concentration (major) need to be from the same catalog year. This catalog year may be any year between the year of initial enrollment to the present, provided continuous enrollment is maintained throughout. See the catalog for definition of "continuous enrollment".

For the **Associate in Science** the following courses are recommended, **BUT ARE NOT REQUIRED** to earn either.

Career Opportunities

The program is designed to be completed in two years (after completion of pre-requisites) and qualifies the student to take the NCLEX-RN licensing examination given by the State of California Board of Registered Nursing. The program satisfies the requirements for an Associate degree and/or a Career Certificate. The graduate is qualified for immediate employment in acute care hospitals and many other health care facilities.

This **Associate Degree** prepare students for an entry-level position in a variety of health care settings following successful completion of the NCLEX-RN. The ADN also serves as a foundation for specialization.

Graduates of the Associate Degree Nursing Program are also eligible to transfer into the upper-division nursing courses in ADN to bachelor's degree nursing programs and ADN to master's degree nursing programs.

Additional Program Information

RESTRICTIONS ON LICENSURE

Persons with substance abuse problems or with conviction of crimes substantially related to the practice of nursing may not be granted a license by the California Board of Registered Nursing. ACCREDITATION

Long Beach City College is fully accredited by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges. The nursing program is accredited by the Accreditation Commission for Education in Nursing, 3343 Peachtree RD. NE Suite 500, Atlanta, GA 30326 and the State of California Board of Registered Nursing.

Students must complete the courses outlined on the curriculum guide for the year in which they take their first nursing course. Students who withdraw from the program will be obligated by the guide and the nursing student handbook of the year of their re-entry into the program.

Every nursing course in the program has a challenge option provided for students enrolled in the course. Students are directed to the individual course syllabus for detailed instructions on how to apply for advanced placement via the challenge option.

Estimated Expenses

Current enrollment fees are \$46 per unit.

Students purchase their own books, school supplies, uniforms and pay a student-body fee. The college has no dormitory facilities; students must provide for own living expenses and transportation. Limited educational grants and loan funds are available.

Transfer Credit

Applicants who wish to transfer from another school of nursing must meet the entrance requirements and spend at least 2 semesters in the Long Beach City College Program. Eligibility for transfer credit, advanced placement, and/or credit by examination is determined on an individual basis by the Program Director. Applicants may attend an information session for additional information regarding transfer into the RN Program.
