## **BREATHE EASY AT LBCC:** CAMPUSES OFFICIALLY SMOKE & TOBACCO FREE

The Long Beach Community College District, in support of the California Community College Chancellor's Office and Board of Governors resolution, is officially implementing a smoke and tobacco-free policy at both campuses.

As of March 1, all use of tobacco, including cigarettes, vape, marijuana (which is already illegal to smoke in public) and chewing tobacco will be strictly prohibited and subject to citation or citation and fine by the Campus Police Unit. All smoking in cars in Long Beach City College parking lots will also be prohibited, and previous designated smoking sections on campus will be repurposed.

#### A BRIGHT FUTURE AWAITS FOR LBCC COUPLE

Chances for a LBCC student to win the nation's largest undergraduate transfer scholarship were doubled this year as two students found themselves as finalists.

What makes this milestone even more unique, is the two finalists - with different majors, learning styles, interests, talents, personalities, and career goals -Jason and Lara Meintjes – are married. While it was announced last week that one of them did win the Jack Kent Cooke Scholarship, the entire Meintjes family are the victors.

Lara has become the fourth LBCC student over the past decade to capture the coveted honor.

The couple have received offers from four of the nine colleges they applied to, including an interview with Yale. And they are still waiting to hear back from four more universities.

Life has certainly changed since 2010 when the two arrived from South Africa with their young daughter in 2010, Jason and Lara literally knew one person in the city of Long Beach.

"We moved here with our suitcases and ideas to figure it all out," said Jason, a photographer who needed a back-up plan to being a rock star.

Lara, an artist seeking access to a printing press, heard that she could use one at LBCC but would have to wait for the class to be offered. It was then she decided that she might as well take a class in the meantime. But it couldn't be just any class – she wanted to take "the scariest class" she could find – public speaking. Enter, Communications Studies Professor Analisa Ridenour. Lara talked Jason into taking the class with her to ease her fears, and the couple now refer to Ridenour as "the gateway drug to knowledge."

"Professor Ridenour gave our class no space to feel uncomfortable. There was just no fighting what she asked of us and there was no room for judgment. She just created such a great environment in so that we grew an extraordinary amount over the class," said Jason.

Lara said that she began the class terrified to speak in front of others and yet now presents at conferences, has testified for the State Assembly and often gives artist talks.

"It all goes back to her," Lara said. "Absolutely thanks to Analisa Ridenour."

The couple, married since 2007, then became committed to furthering their education at LBCC, with Jason as a math and physics major, and Lara majoring in anthropology. Studies are paramount aside from parenting their now 15-year-old daughter, volunteering and staying involved with LBCC extra-curricular activities.

"As young working parents, we have now realized that all of it is possible. This is American Dream stuff," Jason said. "Community college opened doors we didn't think existed because neither of us came from families that could afford university in South Africa."

"Long Beach has given us the grounding from wherever we go from here," Lara said. "This has been such an extraordinary time of abundance in hearing about scholarships, offers and awards, it's been a little hard to focus on Tennyson homework."



## CAMPAIGN FOR COLLEGE OPPORTUNITY RECOGNIZES LBCC

The Campaign for College Opportunity recently honored the Long Beach Community College District as a 2018 Higher Education Champion for Excellence in Transfer.

The Campaign for College Opportunity recognized 12 California Community Colleges that: produced the largest number of students earning an Associate Degree for Transfer (ADT); awarded ADTs as the majority of their Associate Degrees awarded; and/or despite differences in enrollment, awarded more ADTs relative to their enrollment size.

The Long Beach Community College District conferred 782 Associate Degrees for Transfer in 2016-17, representing 51 percent of all associate degrees conferred by the College. Long Beach grew ADT production by 206 from the 2015-2016 academic year, ranking it 4th among the 114 California Community Colleges in terms of ADT growth. In 2016-17, 1,109 students transferred from LBCC to the CSU system.

Since 2010 when the Campaign for College Opportunity sponsored transfer reform legislation, more than 100,000 students have earned an ADT, enabling them to earn their bachelor's degree twice as fast as other transfer students.

CALIFORNIA COMMUNITY COLLEGES BOARD OF GOVERNORS HONORS LBCC WITH ENERGY & SUSTAINABILITY AWARD LBCC Vice President Named 2018 Sustainability Champion

Long Beach City College was recognized by the California Community Colleges Board of Governors as a recipient of the annual Excellence in Energy and Sustainability Awards.

LBCC's Vice President of Business Services Marlene Drinkwine was selected as a 2018 Sustainability Champion. She was instrumental in creating an Integrated Energy Master Plan with the goal to meet and exceed the legislative requirements of AB 32, the California Global Warming Solutions Act. "LBCC is one of the first community colleges in California to undertake sustainability as one of our critical features when planning for our campuses to be completely net zero by 2050," said Drinkwine.

Drinkwine credits the successful LBCC Bond Measures E and LB for enabling sustainability to be at the forefront for all construction and project planning on both the Liberal Arts and Pacific Coast Campuses.

"Each new building has green features, and some were constructed to receive certification in the Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) rating system for environmental quality. Our renovated buildings are updated with features that use less energy now than before their upgrades," she added. are top priorities at Long Beach City College," said LBCCD Superintendent-President Dr. Reagan Ferragamo Romali. Established in 2012, the Energy and Sustainability Awards honor exemplary campus energy projects demonstrating excellence in annual energy cost savings, environmental sustainability and job creation.

"I'm delighted that Marlene was recognized for her outstanding leadership in making Long Beach Community College District greener and more energy efficient," said LBCCD's Board of Trustees President Sunny Zia. "As a Civil and Environmental Engineer, I am a firm believer that

was also recognized for his development of projects ranging from central plant optimization measures, energy management system improvements, retrocommissioning of two buildings for more energy efficient operations, and several LED lighting retrofit projects.





## LBCC IS IN STEP ALONG THE (GUIDED) PATHWAY

Long Beach City College is one of 20 California Community Colleges selected to participate in the California Guided Pathways Project. The goal of the Guided Pathways Project is to help these community colleges implement an integrated, institution-wide approach to student success by creating structured educational experiences that support all students. This experience starts from point of entry to attainment of high-quality postsecondary degrees and certificates that ultimately lead to viable careers.

"The impetus behind Guided Pathways is to help students understand more clearly what they need to do while they are here so they complete their goal as efficiently as possible," said LBCC Associate Dean of Academic Affairs Kenna Hillman.

Guided Pathways is essentially creating a scaffolding to support the "Four Pillars" of the student experience. They are:



**Explore**: Creating clear curricular pathways with course sequencing that lead to employment and further education



**Launch**: Helping students choose and enter their pathway by informing students of what they need to accomplish each semester along the path



**Navigate**: Helping students stay on their path by providing them with timely feedback and support



Land: Ensuring that learning is happening with intentional outcomes.

"One way to ensure completion is to support students by promoting awareness and usage of campus resources so they accomplish activities each semester toward their educational goal," said Hillman. "Are students having their transcripts evaluated? Are they taking advantage of tutoring and career counseling? Are they participating in the honors program and applying for scholarships? These are milestones that students reach along their journey at LBCC. We are currently creating 'roadmaps' that include these semester milestones.

'Roadmaps' will help clarify the educational pathway for students."

The LBCC Guided Pathways task force is currently conducting a survey asking students to provide feedback on their experience while attending LBCC. Results from the survey will help to begin conversations that may lead to more student-centered design of systems.

Another element of the Guided

Pathways is AB 705, the Assembly Bill requiring community college districts to ensure students complete transfer-level coursework in English and math within a one-year timeframe.

In order to implement this bill effectively for LBCC students, changes have been made in placement strategies for English, reading and math courses. Beginning in January 2019, LBCC places new students into the courses of these subjects that are one-level below, or at, transfer level. Continuing students' math, English and reading placements have been adjusted to their appropriate levels. Placement is now based on application data, transcripts and/or the Guided Placement Tool if there is no high school transcript history or attendance was more than 10 years prior.

To ensure that there is no disproportionate impact on student groups, faculty continues evaluate student learning and engagement through an equity-minded lens and inquiring and defining how they know students are learning. It is important to get to know students as individuals in order to learn

> what barriers they might have for subject matter comprehension or in-class engagement.

"Our College has done outstanding things for small groups such as the learning communities of Umoja Scholars Program and Puente, and programs like EOPS and Leaders Across Campus peer mentoring. With Guided Pathways, we are using best practices from programs like these, such as intentional interventions

and timely feedback, and scaling them so that every student has access to support. The newly implemented Starfish Early Alert system is one such example," said Hillman.

The task force is also changing the name from "Guided Pathways" to "Viking Pathways" in order to convey the message that every Long Beach City College employee is involved in one way or another, and that it is a shared common goal.

#### LBCC CELEBRATES RENOVATION OF OLDEST BUILDING ON LIBERAL ARTS CAMPUS

The bond-funded construction project protects history while modernizing facilities

Long Beach Community College District officials celebrated the completion of the Building P upgrade with a ribbon-cutting ceremony today, March 14, at the Long Beach City College Liberal Arts Campus.

The project overhauled the 16,016-square-foot building, which houses the English Department's Composition, Creative Writing, Journalism and Literature programs. This was the first major renovation to the 85-year-old building. Over the years, it had only received minor renovations such as roof and window replacements and the reconfiguration of classroom and office space.

The renovated building provides students and faculty with five new classrooms, one computer lab, a multipurpose room, a digital newsroom for the Viking Newspaper, two meeting rooms and 12 offices. It has been upgraded to meet current building codes, including accessibility to disabled students, seismic structural, and fire alarm upgrades. Building P also now features upgraded audio-visual and information technology systems, including motorized screens and projectors that easily link to various devices. The courtyard is reconfigured, with a new stage built for outdoor events. The \$12.8 million project was funded by the Measure E Bond, which has provided \$616 million for new construction, renovation and repairs at LBCC's Pacific Coast Campus and Liberal Arts Campus.

The project architect is Steinberg Architects. A&B Construction is the general contractor. The Cordoba Corporation oversees and manages all Measure E projects.

Building P historical facts:

- It was the first complete permanent building in 1935 when the Long Beach Junior College (later renamed Long Beach City College in 1946) opened what is now known as the Liberal Arts Campus.
- The designer was noted 20th century architect Kirtland Cutter. It was one of Cutter's last projects after a four-decade career designing hundreds of houses, hotels and offices in the Northwest and California.
- Early campus-wide events took place in the building's courtyard, which was the first public gathering area at the campus.
- Building P originally housed facilities for the drama and debate departments and had six different stages. Building P served as a campus space for theater and musical performances until the current auditorium was built in the mid-1950s.

The Long Beach Community College District (LBCCD) has completed another renovation of an academic building under the Measure E Bond. Building D, which houses Science programs at the Liberal Arts Campus, celebrated with a ribboncutting today, April 4.

All construction was completed from within, with no changes to the outside of the building. Open throughout most of the duration of construction, new laboratories for Allied Health and the Sciences, including Anatomy, Radiology, Medical Assisting and Microbiology were created.

When the Mathematics department moved from Building D to the new Building V in 2015, an entire new floor was opened up to be renovated for the Sciences.

As with all LBCC construction and renovation work, Building D access has now been improved and incorporates "green building practices" that reduces energy and water usage. Other features of the Building D project include:

- First floor renovation of 15,000 square feet (of the 27,000 total square feet) include new classrooms and lab areas, plus paint and cosmetic updates for existing offices;
- Creation of a second microbiology classroom on the second floor that has doubled past capacity;
- New data cables throughout the entire building and audio/visual upgrades in new areas;
- Upgrades to all student and staff restrooms with water-conserving, low-flow fixtures;
- Energy efficient replacements of two rooftop HVAC units and an exhaust fan.

The total construction budget for the modernization of Building D, including design and construction, is nearly \$14.17 million. The project was being funded through the Measure E Bond, which has provided millions of dollars for new construction, renovations and repairs at LBCC's Liberal Arts and Pacific Coast Campuses.

The International Sculpture Center (ISC) established the "Outstanding Educator Award" program in 1996 to recognize individual artist-educators who have excelled at teaching sculpture in institutions of higher learning. An exemplary career combining personal studio practice and measurable academic performance resulted in the unanimous vote for Sterritt, making her the first community college faculty member to win the award.

"The fact that past winners have only included university-level professors and that she is the first community college professor to receive this award is a true testament of Coleen's talent as an artist and as an educator," said Long Beach Community College District Superintendent-President Dr. Reagan Ferragamo Romali.

She has been a professor and faculty coordinator of the Sculpture Program at LBCC since 1998. Sterritt's work has been exhibited throughout the United States, Japan, Spain, Kenya, and South Africa. Her work is held in major collections including MOCA, L.A., and the Los Angeles County Museum



of Art. Sterritt has received numerous awards and fellowships, including John Simon Guggenheim Fellowship, the National Endowment for the Arts, and the Roswell Artist-in-Residence Program. Her teaching career began in 1983 and has included noted positions at California State University, Fullerton; Otis College of Art & Design; and The Claremont Graduate University.

Sterritt will be the subject of a feature article in the International Sculpture Center's award winning publication Sculpture magazine, as well as on the ISC website at **www.sculpture.org**. She will be presented with an award at an upcoming ceremony.

"Once again, the faculty at the Long Beach Community College District has shown that they are of the highest quality and recognized not just nationally, but internationally as well," said LBCCD Board of Trustees President Sunny Zia, "Our students could not be more fortunate than to learn from people like Professor Sterritt and her colleagues."



#### LBCC HIRES BILL HUSAK AS INTERIM ATHLETIC DIRECTOR


Legendary Figure in NCAA Division I Athletics known for reinvigorating Loyola Marymount University Program

The Long Beach Community College District (LBCCD) Board of Trustees approved a one-year contract at its March 27 meeting for William (Bill) Husak, Ph.D. to serve as Interim Athletic Director for Long Beach City College.

Husak enjoyed a 20-year career as Athletic Director of Loyola Marymount University (LMU) where he administered an athletics program of 21 sports, 425 student-athletes and 70 staff before retiring in 2018. During his time at LMU, the Lions won 35 of its 45 conference championships and recorded 45 of its 67 NCAA postseason appearances. Husak also facilitated the renovations of the campus' athletic facilities, and grew support staff for student athletes.

Husak joins LBCC at a momentous time for Viking Athletics as the construction for the new Kinesiology Labs and Aquatic Center will begin during his tenure.

Husak is no stranger to Long Beach. The 40-year Long Beach resident also served as the Senior Associate Athletics Director at California State University, Long Beach (CSULB) from 1993–1998, where he led the charge of development and fundraising for the Athletics program, including the construction of the City's iconic Walter Pyramid.

CCPRO is a professional development and service organization that promotes excellence in California's community college public relations departments.


