



increase in LBCC participation in National Voter Registration Day!

Less than 40 people registered at LBCC in 2018. This year, LBCC obtained 387 registration forms that the City Clerk's Office submitted to the Los Angeles County Registrar's Office. This is a 1,038% increase from 2018 to 2019.

The City Clerk's office managed three registration booths at both LBCC campuses, and were supplemented with volunteers from the Associated Student Body and President's Ambassadors. LBCC faculty members allowed classroom visits throughout the day to encourage new registrants and to inform everyone about upcoming changes in the 2020 election cycle such as new voting machines in Los Angeles County, new locations and dates to vote.







More than 100 community members stopped by Marine Stadium's Local Harvest Farmers Market on Sept. 25 to learn more about the wonderful resources, degrees, and programs offered at Long Beach City College. ## LONG BEACH CITY COLLEGE ANNOUNCES 2019 HALL OF FAME INDUCTEES

An assistant city treasurer, an executive director of a local community organization, a former city manager and CEO, a community services manager, and an author have been named as Long Beach City College's 2019 Hall of Fame inductees, LBCC officials recently announced.

This year's honorees are: Long Beach City Assistant Treasurer Fidel Aguayo; Executive Director of Khmer Parent Association Chan Hopson; retired municipal chief executive officer Roger Kemp; Lakewood City Community Services Manager Chuck Martucci; and author and historian Edwina Romero.

LBCC's 2019 Alumni Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony and Dinner is scheduled for Wed., Nov. 6, at 5:30 p.m. at The Grand Long Beach Events Center, 4101 E. Willow St., Long Beach, CA 90815. The Long Beach City College Foundation Alumni Association hosts this annual event.

#### **ABOUT THIS YEAR'S INDUCTEES:**

FIDEL AGUAYO – Aguayo is the Assistant City Treasurer for the City of Long Beach. He plays a vital financial leadership role that ensures funding for the City's capital projects and infrastructure improvements. His direct responsibilities have a significant impact on the City's economy and long-term financial condition. As Assistant City Treasurer, he oversees the City's \$3 billion debt portfolio consisting of 40 outstanding bond transactions issued on behalf of the Airport, Gas and Oil, Marinas, Port, and Utility systems. He is also responsible for managing the City's \$30 million Master Capital Lease Program consisting of 10 lease obligations.

**CHAN HOPSON** – Hopson is a former teacher who co-founded the Khmer Parent Association and has served as its volunteer executive director since 1995. She has established numerous events, forums, and trainings in Long Beach dealing with health, inter-generational communication, and employment issues in the Cambodian community. Hopson is also the founder of the South-East Asian Scholarship, which has been distributing annual awards to 15 graduating high school seniors for the past 25 years. She has provided more than 10,000 volunteer hours to St. Mary Medical Center, and served on their Benefit Advisory Board for over a decade.


ROGER KEMP – Kemp has served as a city manager for several municipalities including the cities of: Seaside, CA; Placentia, CA; Clifton, NJ; and Meriden, CT. He wrote, edited, and was a contributing author to nearly 50 books dealing with cities. Many of his books focus on various aspects of cities, and highlight national best practices being used to improve the quality of their services as well as their livability.

CHUCK MARTUCCI – Martucci is the Community Services Manager for the City of Lakewood, where he has worked for the past 39 years. In 1992, he organized Lakewood's first Special Olympics program and established the city's first Teen Program at the Lakewood Youth Center in 1995. In 2000, he was honored as the Special Olympics Volunteer Coach of the Year for Southern California. In 2018, Martucci coached the Lakewood Dirtbags to a silver medal in the Special Olympics USA Games Softball Tournament.

**EDWINA ROMERO** – Romero is a prolific author of fiction, poetry, and historical works largely centered on Las Vegas, NM. She worked at California State University, Dominguez Hills until 1981, when she moved to New Mexico and began attending a graduate program at New Mexico Highlands University (NMHU). She later earned her Ph.D. in English at the University of New Mexico in Albuquerque while teaching at NMHU. After 14 years of teaching, Romero accepted a position as the Professional Development Director with a Title V Developing Hispanic-Serving Institutions Federal Grant Project at Luna Community College (LCC) in Las Vegas, NM. She went on to create the Luna Community College Foundation, a Distance Education Program, and technologically-assisted teaching/learning classroom at LCC.

Established in 1972, the Hall of Fame recognizes former LBCC students who have made outstanding contributions to their chosen fields and communities. The 2019 inductees will join past honorees who have attended Long Beach City College, from former Mayor Beverly O'Neill and actor John Amos, to comedian Paul Rodriguez and philanthropist Naomi Rainey-Pierson, and many others.

ong Beach City College began at the Woodrow Wilson High School campus as Long Beach Junior College in 1927, moving to today's Liberal Arts Campus in 1935. Then in 1949, a second campus was added – today's Pacific Coast Campus which celebrates its 70<sup>th</sup> anniversary this year.

The first discussion for a junior college in Long Beach began in 1916, a time in which there were only seven other community colleges in California (Fresno, Santa Barbara, Bakersfield, Fullerton, San Diego, Citrus, and Santa Ana).

The proposed location was for it to be housed with Polytechnic High School, just south of Pacific Coast Highway and mere blocks away from what ended up becoming a crucial part of Long Beach City College, 33 years later.

It was recommended that LBCC have a Technical Institute at what is today's Renaissance High School for the Arts located at Eighth Street and Long Beach Boulevard. LBCC's General Adult Division classes were held there from 1945 to 1952.

It wasn't until 1949 that the former Hamilton Junior High School became LBCC's Business and Technology Division. The old "BTD" has now evolved into today's Pacific Coast Campus.

The Pacific Coast Campus is now home to several programs including ESL, Child Development, Horticulture, Floral Design, Foster and Kinship Care Education, the Lifetime Learning Center, Performing Arts, Photography, many vocational Trades, a Welcome Center, Workforce Development and the Viking Vault.

The physical appearance of the Pacific Coast Campus is also changing. Original buildings like AA and BB have been given a modern update, and new construction like Buildings GG and RR have been added. Future plans include a new parking structure facing Pacific Coast Highway and the renovation of Building MM.

Seventy years after LBCC took over the Hamilton Junior High School, PCC is now home to the Mini-Grand Prix. It is home to the PCC Mailroom. It is a place where you can find a close-knit family of faculty and staff.

## LBCC WINS GRANT FOR IMPROVING ONLINE CTE PATHWAYS

The California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office has awarded Long Beach City College with a one-year, \$500,000 grant known as the Career Technical Education Online Teaching Improvement Project (COTIP).

Throughout the 2019-2020 fiscal year, COTIP will work to improve online Career Technical Education (CTE) pathways at LBCC through a collaboration between the Office of Online Learning and Educational Technology (OLET), the department of Computer and Offices Studies (COS), Library, and CTE faculty to improve the number and quality of online programs.


"Online learning is growing rapidly in higher education and over the past few years at LBCC our online enrollments and class sessions have increased by 120 percent and our success rates by 14 percent," said Dr. Hussam Kashou, LBCC Associate Dean of Online Learning & Educational Technology and Principal Investigator of the COTIP grant project. "Last year alone, distance learning enrollments increased by 16 percent and distance learning success rates by 5 percent. Distance Education helps meet the needs of our student population and the primary goal of the COTIP grant project is to improve access to, and quality of, existing online courses, to develop fully online certificates, and enhance our online education services for faculty and students."

The long-term goal of the grant period is to focus on professional development, and improving the availability and quality of online certificates through instructional redesign, support services and resources for students and faculty. The project will pilot this process for five certificates in COS, one certificate in Library, and create a framework that will be applicable across different departments and types of awards.

A CTE faculty cohort will be created and will soon begin reviewing pilot online courses, aligning them with the CVC-OEI Online Course Design rubric, and supporting the completion of various aspects of the grant. A Web Development "boot camp" will also be developed to help students quickly enter the workforce and increase their hourly earnings.

#### Other efforts include:

- Improving infrastructure and workflow of Online Education support services and resources for faculty and students.
- Developing and maintaining new Online Learning Services/Resources Websites for Distance Learning Faculty.
- Evaluating current infrastructure and workflow of faculty and student services for accessing and utilizing Distance Education tools, resources, and support services.
- Developing a Distance Education Faculty Handbook and Distance Education Student Readiness Handbook with input from college constituents.
- Developing and maintaining an OER/ZTC resource website to support the identification and integration of OER/ZTC resources into online courses
- Supporting the integration of OER/ZTC textbooks into online CTE courses.
- Thoroughly tracking and documenting COTIP project improvements to create a framework for other departments to improve and increase their online certificates, credentials, and programs.





Long Beach City College Horticulture Associate Professor, Jorge Ochoa, has been recognized in his important role in discovering a new species of passion flower.

Ochoa's first passion flower expedition took place in 2001 when he visited Costa Rica. Since then, he has been to Brazil, Ecuador, Columbia, Cuba, and Southern Mexico, all on exhibitions to look for new species of passion flowers native to those regions.

In 2011–2012, Ochoa participated in a project with scientists from universities in Missouri and Kansas to do the genetic analysis of a group of passion flowers. A visit to the Dominican Republic resulted in the discovery of a new plant, which was then cultivated and grown at Long Beach City College's Horticulture garden on the Pacific Coast Campus. Ochoa successfully got the plant to flower, which was the first time it flowered in cultivation.

This flowering confirmed it was indeed an undescribed species of passion flower. Ochoa then recorded the flower, measuring characteristics such as the fruit, leaves, corona, and filaments. This allowed the type of specimen to be determined. A type specimen is the first record of any plant when it gets discovered. The study included a genetic analysis to put this new species into a family tree.

This first record is the type specimen, which was then deposited in the Missouri Botanic Gardens Herbarium. And as of this writing (early October) *Passiflora intricata* is again flowering at the LBCC Horticulture Garden.

"Having the record of the flower, the flower verified it was indeed a new species," said Ochoa. "The next step was to enter it for publication so it would be accepted as a new plant."

It is common practice that when a new species has been determined/accepted into the scientific community, it must be published.

Ochoa's work has now resulted in the discovery and publication of "Passiflora intricata" an apetalous (having no petals) new species from the Dominican Republic. The name "intricata" comes from the Latin word for tangled, which is reference to the flower's long and slender filaments that look tangled (see photos). The discovery was recognized by the peer-reviewed scientific journal Phytotaxa.

## MISTY MAY-TREANOR TO BE INDUCTED IN U.S. OLYMPIC & PARALYMPIC HALL OF FAME

The United State Olympic & Paralympic Committee recently announced Long Beach City College's Director of Volleyball Operations, Misty May-Treanor, will be honored and inducted in the U.S. Olympic & Paralympic Hall of Fame class of 2019 on Fri., Nov. 1 at the U.S. Olympic & Paralympic Training Center in Colorado Springs, CO.

May-Treanor is the most decorated athlete in beach volleyball history, earning three gold medals for beach volleyball at the Olympics Games (2004, 2008, 2012) as well as three gold (2003, 2005, 2007) and one silver (2011) medal at the Beach Volleyball World Championships.

As an indoor volleyball champion, she won one bronze medal at the Pan American Games in 1999, one NCAA Division 1 Championship at Long Beach State in 1998 and two California State Championships at Newport Harbor High School (1991–1995).

At LBCC, May-Treanor has led the indoor volleyball team and beach volleyball team to back-to-back South Coast Conference (SCC) Championships and has earned the SCC Coach of the Year (2018, 2019) for each sport. For beach volleyball, she has led the team to a Pairs State Championship (2017) and two Team Runner-Up State Championships (2018, 2019).

May-Treanor is currently in-season with the 2019 indoor volleyball team.


