
LBCC Slashes \$10.4M From Budget Deficit Without Cuts to Personnel or Programs

Long Beach City College dramatically reduced its preliminary 2017-2018 \$10.7 million budget deficit to \$300,000 without layoffs or cuts to programs.

The deficit was reduced through cuts in expenses and an aggressive enrollment push. In addition, a number of employees accepted the Supplemental Employee Retirement Plan (SERP) that the College offered last June which allowed strategic reorganization of staff.

LBCC made an aggressive push to enroll additional students into the Summer Session classes which resulted in a 21 percent increase in full-time equivalent students compared to last year's Summer Session numbers.

LBCC also provided a number of enrollment events to assist future and current LBCC students in preparation for the Fall Semester.



Despite the reductions that began in Spring 2018, student success continued to improve at LBCC. In June 2018, 44 students graduated from LBCC with 4.0 GPA. This number is compared to 14 students in 2017 who achieved a perfect GPA.

Space is still available for new students at LBCC for Fall Semester. Late-starting classes begin Sept. 24 and Oct. 22.



‘Maritime Center of Excellence’ Launched in Long Beach

Port of Long Beach and Long Beach City College leaders officially launched an innovative new program on Aug. 8 to provide opportunities to local students seeking the employment skills they need to join the goods movement workforce.

The Port of Long Beach Maritime Center of Excellence at Long Beach City College will target a variety of programs for occupations in the global logistics and supply chain industries that require more education than a high school diploma, but less than a four-year college degree.

The Long Beach Board of Harbor Commissioners approved \$60,000 in funding for the program’s first year as a pilot project. The Maritime Center joins the Academy of Global Logistics at Cabrillo High School as a keystone of the Port’s education outreach efforts.

The training at the Maritime Center of Excellence will focus on in-demand occupations which may include jobs like: warehouse and distribution supervisor, transportation supervisor, logistics and supply chain specialist, order processor, shipping and receiving clerk, and scheduler and operations

coordinator. As part of the one-year pilot program, LBCC will convene an advisory group with industry partners in 2018 to identify in-demand middle-skills jobs. The goal is to develop non-academic training to meet the needs of local employers, and prepare community members for careers in logistics and supply chain management.

LBCCD Board of Trustees Approve Four-Year Contract for Dr. Reagan F. Romali



The Long Beach Community College District Board of Trustees approved a new four-year contract for Superintendent-President Dr. Reagan F. Romali at their Aug. 21 meeting.

“Dr. Romali has made some amazing accomplishments during her short time here at Long Beach City College,” said Board President Sunny Zia. “This past year, she’s dramatically decreased our multi-million dollar deficit without layoffs or cuts to programs, increased summer enrollment, increased the number of students who graduated with honors, and boosted employee morale on campus. We are so proud that we have been able to bring a leader of her experience and caliber to LBCC.”

During the August Trustee meeting, it was also announced that the 2017-2018 budget deficit was reduced from \$10.7 million to \$300,000. LBCC is looking at a three-phase plan to

eliminate the remaining deficit that includes reorganization of personnel and cutting expenditures.

“Dr. Romali’s many years of experience as a college president gave her the ability to jump in immediately and address LBCC’s challenges when she first got here,” said Zia. “She made tremendous progress and we wanted to recognize this success. The new agreement starts to close the gap between her salary and our former Superintendent-President with an annual pay increase that is in line with our faculty.”

“I am so grateful that I have been given the opportunity to continue to serve LBCC and our communities, and to work with the best faculty and staff in the country who are dedicated to student success,” said Romali.

Free Coding Boot Camp for Young Women in High School at LBCC

Long Beach City College is offering a free boot camp workshop series geared towards young women in high school, grades 10 through 12. This boot camp aims to give young women exposure to different career opportunities available within the computer science field while teaching them how to code.

Participants can sign up on a first-come, first-serve basis at <https://tinyurl.com/LBCCcoding>. Space is limited. Participants must be attending a high school in Avalon, Lakewood, Long Beach or Signal Hill.

Classes will be held every other Saturday, beginning on Sept. 15 through Dec. 15, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. at LBCC's Pacific Coast Campus. During the four-month, 28-hour boot camp, students will:

- Learn how to develop their own hands-on computer science programming projects with interactive computer programs using Java programming language.
- Hear from guest speakers who work in the tech industry.
- Take off-site visits to tour local technology companies.
- Create their own LinkedIn profile, and a portfolio of accomplishments and work completed during the camp. They will receive guidance on how to connect with companies online, and how to develop their job search skills.
- Receive an orientation on LBCC offerings and opportunities for enrolling into classes concurrently while taking high school courses.



The boot camp will be taught by LBCC Computer Office Studies faculty member Kimberly Davis. She will share her knowledge in programming languages C++, C#, Java, and Visual Basic, as well as her experience with Oracle, MySQL, Microsoft Access, and Dreamweaver.

Long Beach City College Rolls Out New Athletic Viking Logo

For the first time in Long Beach City College history, an athletic logo was unveiled depicting the College's Viking mascot.

"We are extremely excited and proud to introduce our new athletic logo to the community," said LBCC Superintendent-President Dr. Reagan F. Romali. "The new athletic Viking logo builds on the original mascot that has been with us since 1927. The new Viking logo includes features that make it uniquely Long Beach City College."

The new LBCC athletic logo shows a black outline side profile of a Viking wearing a helmet accented with red. The Viking's face is gray to reflect LBCC's pride and belief that diversity is a great strength. The College's school colors of black, white and red are used throughout the logo. The Viking's mantle was inspired by ocean waves and a palm tree frond.

"This is a strong mascot that reflects LBCC's history and pride," said LBCC Athletic Director Randy Totorp, who originally commissioned the logo. "We have a top-notch Athletic program here at LBCC, and we are so happy to have this amazing logo that we can feature on all of our athletic uniforms."

Long Beach City College's Public Affairs and Marketing department designed the new logo with feedback from LBCC students, faculty, staff and management.

This athletic logo will not replace the current LBCC logo, which was introduced in 2008.

For more than 90 years, athletics has been a source of great pride at LBCC. Long Beach City College has earned 92 state championships, more than any other community college in California.



ADN Program Receives Strong Workforce Gold Star



Congratulations to Long Beach City College's Nursing, Associate Degree (ADN) program for being the only LBCC program to receive Strong Workforce GOLD star from the California Community College Chancellor's Office.

A Strong Workforce Star is earned when a program improves student employment by 50 percent, wage outcomes by 70 percent, and 90 percent or more of their students are employed by a job similar to their field of study. The ADN program met all three targets with 100 percent of the cohorts employed in a job similar to the field of study.

Mark Marano Named Early Educator of the Year



Long Beach City College Child Development Center (CDC) teacher Mark Marano was named Early Educator of the Year by Child360, making him the third LBCC teacher in four years to be honored with the award.

The Annual Child360 Early Educator of the Year Awards is a Los Angeles county teacher recognition program that acknowledges those who teach children 0 – 5 years of age, known as the most critical window for children when the architecture of the brain is being developed.

Marano has worked at the PCC's CDC since August of 2013.

A Long Beach resident, Marano has known since high school that he wanted to work as a teacher of young children.

“My sister had a hard time in school due to ineffective teachers so I wanted to dedicate my life to being a responsive teacher—one that meets children where they are and helps them grow and develop, a teacher that inspires a love for learning. I began working with young children in 2001, and 17 years later I’m still hooked!” he said.

In 2014 and 2017, LBCC's Pacific Coast Campus (PCC) CDC teachers Debbi Watts and Angelica Hernandez captured the honor. Watts, Hernandez and Marano all completed the bulk of their Early Childhood Education units and earned their Associates Degrees from LBCC.

Kaplinsky Elected to National Teacher Education Program Board

Long Beach City College Assistant Professor of Reading, Megan Kaplinsky, has been elected to serve as Secretary on the Executive Board of the National Association of Community College Teacher Education Programs (NACCTEP). NACCTEP promotes the community college's role in the recruitment, preparation, retention, and renewal of diverse early childhood and K-12 teachers. NACCTEP aims to advance quality teacher education programs at the community college level. Kaplinsky has been dedicated to the redevelopment of a teacher education program at LBCC since she arrived five years ago, after teaching at the K-12 level.



“This is a dream job that I was meant to do right now,” Kaplinsky said. “The National Board allows me to advocate for community colleges and for LBCC to promote our role in developing future teacher candidates.”

Kaplinsky's term is for two years.

Introducing Starfish Early Alert

Starfish is a tool that provides an online space for instructors to connect with their students about class performance. Through Starfish, instructors can activate a network of support for students that extends beyond the classroom. You can also watch this [brief video](#) to find out how Starfish works between [instructors](#), [staff](#) and [students](#).

Participating LBCC instructors can provide students with feedback in the form of a kudo, flag or referral. Staff also have an important role in Starfish by resolving flags or raising kudoes.

Flags


When your instructor raises a Flag, they see opportunities for you to improve your grade.



Referrals

When your instructor sends you a Referral, you will be connected with specific LBCC services such as tutoring and counseling.

LBCC Announces 2018 Hall of Fame Inductees

A Long Beach City Councilmember, a veteran law enforcement commander, an educator who continues to give back to the community college he served, and an attorney who is recognized in her expertise in special education law have been named as Long Beach City College's 2018 Hall of Fame inductees, LBCC officials recently announced.

This year's honorees are: Long Beach City Councilmember Dee Andrews; Seal Beach Police Commander Stephen Bowles; community volunteer and retired educator Dr. John Fylpaa; and attorney Janeen Steel.

LBCC's 2018 Alumni Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony and Dinner is scheduled for Wed., Oct. 17, at 5:30 p.m. at The Grand Long Beach Events Center, 4101 E. Willow St., Long Beach, CA 90815. The LBCC Foundation hosts this annual event.

About this year's inductees:

Dee Andrews – Referred to as the “Son of the Sixth,” Andrews is the native son and representative for the Long Beach City Council's sixth district. He has lived in the Central Long Beach area since age five, excelling in athletics at Poly High School, LBCC and Cal State Long Beach. The former NFL player later became a mentor for juveniles before being elected to the City Council in 2007. His third term was captured in 2016 as a write-in candidate.

Stephen Bowles – Second in Command to the Seal Beach Police Chief, Bowles has served more than 24 years in law enforcement for the city in which he also volunteers extensively. The recipient of the Medal of Merit for his role as first responder and Public Information Officer in the Salon Meritage mass shooting, the past Seal Beach Police Officer of the Year is also the founding member of the National Law Enforcement Cancer Support Foundation.

John Fylpaa – With an entire career and productive retirement dedicated to the betterment of LBCC students' lives, Fylpaa is one of the most respected educators in the College's 91-year history. The former Associated Student Body Cabinet Advisor, Dean of Student Affairs and Dean of Athletics continues to play a role in mentoring and scholarship assistance for LBCC students through the John Fylpaa Leadership Institute. He serves his community through volunteerism with Meals on Wheels, Long Beach Schools Financial Credit Union, the Century Club and many other organizations.

Janeen Steel – One of the foremost experts in special education law, Steel is the founder of the non-profit Learning Rights Law Center. She earned her Juris Doctor at the University of California, Los Angeles School of Law, where she received the UCLA La Raza Alumni Association Cesar Chavez Summer Fellowship to create the blueprint for her future – the Learning Rights Manual, an advocacy guide for families of students with disabilities. At LBCC's 85th anniversary gala she was honored as a “Viking of the Decade” for her advocacy work in education for disadvantaged children with disabilities.

Established in 1972, the Hall of Fame recognizes former LBCC students who have made outstanding contributions to their chosen fields and communities. The 2018 honorees will join past honorees who have attended Long Beach City College, from former Mayor Beverly O'Neill and actor John Amos, to comedian Paul Rodriguez and philanthropist Naomi Rainey-Pierson, and many others.

Foundation Receives \$1 Million for Long Beach College Promise Scholarships

The Long Beach City College Foundation received a gift of real estate, which turned into one of the largest donations in the Foundation's history. The donation was from a Long Beach couple to support the Long Beach College Promise.

According to LBCC Foundation Executive Director Elizabeth McCann, the residential property closed escrow in July and garnered \$1 million. This money will be set aside for the Long Beach College Promise scholarship, which provides qualified Long Beach Unified School District high school graduates a free first year of tuition at Long Beach City College.

The Long Beach couple who donated the property are both alumni of LBCC and CSULB, and requested anonymity. Their gift is one of the most significant LBCC has received. Since the Long Beach College Promise went into effect 10 years ago, its success has generated national awards for LBCC and inspired schools across the country to enact similar seamless education agreements with free community college options often included.

McCann is hopeful that others will be inspired to make similar investments in higher education to benefit the students of Long Beach. Donors can deduct the property's fair market value while avoiding capital gains taxes when making donations of real estate to 501(c)(3) charities, such as the LBCC Foundation.
