MESSAGE FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT-PRESIDENT

But this past month, we've been lucky to be on the receiving end of many generous donations to assist our students in need. Sadly, we have many LBCC students who are homeless and/or face food insecurities. But we are surrounded by many people who are passionate about helping our students out.

From small gestures to the bigger picture - believe me, it all counts.

In our efforts to have Healthy Vikings at our College, we have been actively working with CalFresh in our Child Development Centers and Student Health Services. We accepted a generous donation of non-perishable foods from our Foundation's associate group and the Southwest Regional Council of Carpenters. Various ASB student groups are doing what they can to help their fellow students by holding clothing and food drives. And our President's Ambassadors are making oatmeal kits to ensure that students have a hot, nutritious breakfast.

Other community groups, like the National Council of Jewish Women, Long Beach chapter, have also taken the initiative to work with our LBCC staff for the past two years on battling food insecurities. They championed the idea to start a food cupboard at both campuses. These wonderful women have generously donated and delivered at least \$2,500 worth of food. They truly have gone above and beyond to help our LBCC students. And I'm excited to say that we will soon open up our food pantries called the Viking Vaults.

I would also like to thank Long Beach Community College District Board of Trustees President Sunny Zia and Trustee Dr. Virginia Baxter for their tireless work to bring in additional donations, and more awareness to assist our homeless students.

As we start gearing up for the holidays, we will be hosting events and donation drives to help students in need. Here are some ways you could help:

LBCC CHILD DEVELOPMENT CENTERS OBTAIN HIGH RANKINGS

Long Beach City College Child Development Centers (CDC) and Learning Labs received high praise from the Quality Start Los Angeles. Both the Liberal Arts and Pacific Coast Campus CDCs were ranked a very high level of four out of five tiers.

"We are so proud of our Center managers and teaching teams for their ongoing dedication and professionalism," said Gene Carbonaro, who oversees the CDCs as the Dean of the School of Career Technical Education. "It was amazing to have a professional organization come out to validate the great work we do here every day."

Quality Start Los Angeles is a voluntary quality rating and improvement system designed to help parents choose the best early childhood education for their family. Standards are based on seven elements of the **California Quality Rating Matrix**. Points are accumulated for each of the elements and the total amount of points determines the tier rating. Once rated, early learning programs such as LBCC's receive specialized support aligned with their particular rating such as coaching, classroom tools, resources, training, and financial incentives that help improve their program's quality.

The CDC ranking follows the recent announcement that LBCC CDC teacher Mark Marano was named Early Educator of the Year by Child360. This made Marano the third LBCC teacher in four years to be honored with the award.

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The Long Beach College Promise announced a new milestone with the unveiling of Promise 2.0. Beginning in fall 2019, the enhanced initiative will feature a guaranteed transition from Long Beach City College (LBCC) to California State University, Long Beach (CSULB) for qualifying graduates of Long Beach Unified School District (LBUSD). In addition, the Port of Long Beach was welcomed as the first industry partner in the Long Beach College Promise.

LBUSD graduates eligible for Promise 2.0 will attend LBCC to complete their lower division courses and thereafter receive guaranteed admission to CSULB.

By entering into Promise 2.0, LBUSD students would benefit by:

- Paying a lower tuition rate by attending LBCC, including free tuition for the first year.
- Earning transferable college credit at LBCC towards a bachelor's degree from CSULB.
- Receiving priority registration for classes at LBCC.
- Earning a bachelor's degree from CSULB.
- Ensuring a smooth transition from LBCC to CSULB. Students will be able to map out courses at both institutions. Students would also receive guidance from both LBCC counselors and CSULB academic advisors.
- Being part of a cohort of Promise 2.0 students.
- Receiving both LBCC and CSULB student ID cards that will provide students with the benefits of both colleges, allowing them to participate in special events at both CSULB and LBCC.

The university, the community college and the school district first committed to The Promise in 2008, extending the promise of a college education to every student in the Long Beach Unified School District. The City of Long Beach and its Mayor's Office joined the initiative in 2014. Since its inception, The Promise has served as a model for communities in California and across the nation to develop partnerships centered on student success.

As the first industry partner of The Promise, the Port will strengthen its partnerships with LBUSD, LBCC and CSULB to further their education outreach and workforce goals to prepare the next generation of leaders in the maritime industry by building awareness and understanding of the Port and the maritime industry, developing a skilled workforce that supports international trade and goods movement by creating career pathways and programs, training the trainer by ensuring that teachers and administrators have access to the maritime industry for curriculum development, and creating an online hub that provides job and training resources, career profiles and opportunities to attend trade-related educational events.

SOUTHWEST REGIONAL COUNCIL OF CARPENTERS GIVES LARGE FOOD DONATION TO LBCC STUDENTS

Long Beach City College received a donation of more than 80 cases of food on Sept. 21, from the Southwest Regional Council of Carpenters. The food will be distributed to LBCC students in need.

"Long Beach Community College District is grateful to the Southwest Regional Council of Carpenters for their support of our students as the beneficiary of this very generous donation," said Long Beach Community College District Board of Trustees President Sunny Zia. "Our students are dealing with many challenges on a daily basis. More and more students are dealing with food insecurity and are too hungry to learn. This donation will be a huge help as we continue our efforts in ending food and housing insecurity at LBCC."

President Zia and Superintendent-President Dr. Reagan F. Romali were on hand at the LBCC Pacific Coast Campus to accept a variety of pastas, mixes and canned goods from the Southwest Regional Council of Carpenters Special Representative Ted Jimenez and other members of the Carpenters union.

The Carpenters' Volunteer Committee had previously donated their time assisting the United Way in unloading their rigs. In return, the United Way provided pallets of food for the Union to distribute to local non-profit groups.

It was Jimenez who initially contacted Zia about making the donation. Zia and LBCCD Board Member Dr. Virginia Baxter lead a LBCC Foundation Associate Group that assists students in need.

"This fell into place so well," said Jimenez. "The Southwest Regional Council of Carpenters are always looking for ways to help our community because of our love for this country. LBCC Honors Student Published in Scribendi for First Time



The visual art of Long Beach City College student Lara Lee Meintjes has been selected to appear in the latest issue of *Scribendi*, Western Regional Honors Council's annual print publication of creative work from undergraduate honors students from more than 200 institutions. Meintjes is the first LBCC student to be published in *Scribendi*.

The project selected for publication is Meintjes' watercolor, pen and crayon work titled "Doris, or: Every Time I Open my Mouth in Public."

"As a child I constantly questioned the world, but as soon as a question emerged I would try to answer it myself, so I often made strange and sometimes outlandish statements," Meintjes said. "My father would laugh and call me 'Doris' in response to these rambles. I painted this piece fairly soon after he died as a sort of nod to our relationship and also that part of myself that still engages in those questions, if in a somewhat more restrained manner. It references social awkwardness and the feeling that once one opens one's mouth the words are out in the world and the speaker no longer has any control over them."

Meintjes will be graduating in Spring 2019 and transferring into the UC system. She says she is excited to move on but also grateful for the extraordinary growth that LBCC has facilitated within her. She eventually hopes to earn a Ph.D., and to work in legal anthropology and public policy.

"The work that *Scribendi* has published is typical of Lara's ingenuity, intelligence, and great sense of humor," said LBCC Honors Coordinator Dr. Jeff Wheeler. Scribendi solicits work in a number of different categories such as poetry, creative nonfiction, short fiction, foreign language, visual art, photography, and open media. Only undergraduate students currently enrolled in an accredited honors program in a college in the Western Regional Honors Council, or the National Collegiate Honors Council, are eligible to submit work to be considered for publication in Scribendi.
