

APPOINTS NEW INTERIM SUPERINTENDENT-PRESIDENT



uring a Special Board of Trustees
Meeting, the Long Beach Community
College District Board of Trustees
unanimously voted to appoint current Long
Beach City College Vice President of Student
Services Dr. Mike Muñoz as the new Interim
Superintendent-President.

Dr. Muñoz began his new role on March 4, 2021. His contract will end on June 30, 2022.

The Board of Trustees also announced that the search for a candidate to fill the Superintendent-President position is suspended for now. It will resume next year to ensure the District has ample time to conduct a search for a final candidate.

Dr. Muñoz joined LBCC in 2018 as the Vice President of Student Services. He has led the LBCC Student Support Services team in several accomplishments including the increase enrollment of Long Beach College Promise Direct High School Matriculants by more than 30% from Fall 2018 to Fall 2019, increased the number of Pell Recipients by 27% in 2019-20, expanded services in mental health and basic needs, and supported the increase in completions through the implementation of completion counseling efforts. He pushed for additional technology such as a virtual queue line, chat box functions that have become increasingly used during the pandemic to assist LBCC staff to be more efficient and enhance communication between the College and students. He has also provided support and leadership by serving on the Long Beach College Promise Steering Committee.

Dr. Muñoz has been instrumental in LBCC's work so far in advancing racial equity work at the College as Co-Chair of the President's Taskforce on Race & Equity, and serves as the lead Administrator for the College's Framework for Reconciliation.

He has extensive experience teaching both at the undergraduate and graduate level in counseling and higher education. He's taught master's level courses at California State University, Long Beach and USC, and doctoral level courses at California State University, Los Angeles. He's currently serving as an Adjunct Professor of Higher Education at the USC Rossier's School of Education teaching a leadership course focused on the Community Colleges. Dr. Muñoz was recognized as Outstanding Faculty Member in 2019 from USC's Rossier Student Organization, and the 2018 Dr. Cynthia S. Johnson Award from CSULB that recognized his contributions to higher education through exceptional student mentoring.

His national leadership experience includes: serving on the Board of Directors for the National Community Colleges Hispanic Council, a diversity council of the American Association of Community Colleges; a founding Board Member of COLEGAS, the California Community Colleges Latinx professional association; and as a Member of the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office Fiscal Advisory Committee.

Dr. Muñoz is a proud product of the California Community College system. He attended East Los Angeles College and Fullerton College before transferring to the University of California, Irvine, where he received his bachelor's degree in Psychology and Social Behavior. He received his master's degree in Counseling, and his doctor of education with a specialization in community college leadership, from California State University, Long Beach.

The Board also appointed LBCC Dean of Counseling and Student Support Services Dr. Nohel Corral as the Interim Vice President of Student Services. He also began in his new role on March 14, 2021.

- A presentation of "Black Minds Matter" with Dr. J. Luke Wood.
- Superintendent-President Dr. Mike Muñoz hosted a Facebook live discussion with attorney Omarr K. Rambert and Board President Ntuk.

Ntuk, Chico to Lead LBCCD Board of Trustees Chico, Malauulu Sworn-In

t its Annual Organization, Oath of Office and Regular Session meeting on Monday, December 21, the Long Beach Community College District (LBCCD) Board of Trustees elected Uduak-Joe Ntuk as President of the LBCCD Board of Trustees and new Trustee Herlinda Chico was elected Vice President. Vice President Chico was sworn-in to represent Area 4 of the College District, and Trustee Vivian Malauulu was sworn-in for her second term.

In this role, President Ntuk will preside over the meetings of the Board and act as chief spokesperson for the Board, among other duties. The positions are elected annually among the five Board members, to a one-year term.

President Ntuk was elected in 2018 and is the first African-American male elected to serve on the Board since Long Beach City College's founding in 1927. He earned his Associate of Arts degree in Liberal Arts at LBCC, a Bachelor of Science in Chemical Engineering at California State University, Long Beach, and his Master of Science in Engineering at the University of Southern California. In 2019, he was appointed by California Governor Gavin Newsom as the State Oil and Gas Supervisor responsible for managing the state's Geologic Energy Management

Division. On the LBCCD Board he represents Area 1, covering the Uptown North Long Beach area of the City.

Vice President Chico is the first Latina elected to the Board to represent Area 4, which is comprised of Santa Catalina Island, East Long Beach, and Signal Hill. She has been politically active since the age of 19, and has volunteered on several campaigns and community organizations over the decades. She has worked with and been honored by many diverse groups including the Long Beach Branch NAACP, has won the Long Beach Gay and Lesbian Pride Whitey Littlefield Bridge Builder Award, Centro Cha, captured the Cambodian Association of America's Outstanding Public Service Award and Assembly Member Patrick O'Donnell's Women of Distinction Award. For the past four years, she has been a field deputy for Los Angeles County Supervisor Janice Hahn.

Trustee Malauulu was first elected to the Board of Trustees in 2016, and was unopposed in 2020. She is the first the first Latina elected to the Long Beach Community College District Board of Trustees to represent Area 2 which covers all of West Long Beach and the south-central parts of the city.

ong Beach City College celebrated the completion of a \$29-million renovation of the Auditorium with a virtual ribbon cutting ceremony that premiered December 10 on YouTube. The renovation project is an update for the Auditorium with a new dance studio, new visual display systems, updated lobby with modernized fixtures, costume shop, green room, air conditioning and more.

The Auditorium has hosted famous performers and budding artists since it first opened in 1957. Notable performers who have appeared on the LBCC Auditorium stage include: musicians like Dave Brubeck and Kenny G.; actors such as Val Kilmer and Vincent Price; singer Shirley Jones; and speakers including Dr. Cornel West and CNN political contributor Van Jones. The building had long been admired for its acoustics and history of special performances, but became in severe need of upgrading for ADA compliance and audio/ visual advancements throughout the years

The renovation project began in 2018, and was paid for with funds from Measure E and Measure LB Bonds approved by the voters for renovation and repairs at both LBCC's Pacific Coast Campus and Liberal Arts Campuses. The project architect is SVA Architects. Novus Construction is the general contractor. The Cordoba Corporation oversees and manages all Measure E and LB projects.

ong Beach City College announced that conditioning classes for the Athletics program will resume in-person instruction for some sports on Mon., April 12. These classes are contingent men's and women's soccer; softball; on Los Angeles County being moved to the red tier of California's reopening classification system and City of Long Beach's Health Orders' alignment with the State's COVID-19 Guidelines for Higher Education.

The conditioning classes will be held outdoors and will practice all of the standard COVID-19 safety protocols that LBCC has implemented during the pandemic.

Sports returning to campus for conditioning include: beach volleyball; baseball; men's and women's basketball; cheer; men's and women's cross country; football; men's and women's swim/dive: men's and women's track and field; men's and women's volleyball; and men and women's water polo.

The South Coast Conference (SCC) decided on Feb. 25, 2020 to suspend athletic conference competition for traditional spring sports for the 2021 season. However, SCC did allow individual colleges the opportunity to conduct conditioning classes and compete as circumstances allowed.

The LBCC Athletics Department Re-Socialization Plan has been reviewed and approved by the College. It is based on the best practices put forth by the Institutes of Higher Education as well as the health agencies of California, Los Angeles County and the City of Long Beach.

LBCC will continue to follow State and local guidelines including those received from Los Angeles County and the City of Long Beach Health Department for any changes and steps to re-opening.





ulti-level green facility, completed early and under budget, adds new landmark face to campus.

Long Beach Community College District (LBCCD) celebrated the grand opening of a new parking structure at Long Beach City College's Pacific Coast Campus (PCC) with a video tour and virtual ribboncutting ceremony airing from the College's website at www.LBCC.edu on December 17.

The project came in \$500,000 under the \$18.4 million estimated budget.

Some features of the four-level, energy-efficient parking structure include:

- 530 PCC-convenient parking stalls and secure bicycle parking
- An app for both Android and Apple devices can be downloaded free to display real-time parking availability in the new structure
- Permanent signage identifying Long Beach City
 College and the Pacific Coast Campus, as well as
 versatile space for changeable signs to market
 campus events to the neighborhood and the
 thousands of people who drive by on PCH every day

Encourages energy efficiency and strengthens
 LBCCD's Integrated Energy Master Plan by providing
 33 Electric Vehicle Charging Stations, 45 Clean Air
 Vehicle Spaces, rooftop Photovoltaic (Solar) Panels
 to help generate energy to power the building, and
 a Modular Wetlands System with bio filtration to
 remove sediment from storm water runoff

The project was funded through the Measure LB bond approved by the voters for renovation and repairs at LBCC's Pacific Coast Campus and Liberal Arts Campus.

The project architect is CPC, and McCarthy Building Company is the general contractor. The Cordoba Corporation oversees and manages all Measure E and LB projects.



Basic Needs Grant Comes to LBCC Foundation Just in Time for the Winter Break

The California Community College Foundation's CARES for Food Security fund (LA County CARES Funding) recently awarded the Long Beach City College Foundation with a \$275,000 grant to assist students with Basic Needs services.

Funds enabled the LBCC Foundation to purchase six commercial refrigeration units that will allow the Basic Needs Office to provide perishable goods to students at both campuses. Generous gift cards for food were also provided to more than 1,250 students to use during the Winter intersession.

The grant also allowed for outreach to all students enrolled in Fall 2020. More than 24,400 students received a postcard advertising the services of LBCC's Basic Needs area.

The Long Beach Community College District Board of Trustees appointed Robyn Gordon-Peterson as their representative on the Long Beach City College Personnel Commission.


The Personnel Commission is comprised of three District residents who work with the governing board and College administrators in the hiring of District Classified Professional employees and establishing best practices in personnel administration.

She is an active community volunteer currently serving as Board Chair for the Long Beach Day Nursery, Vice President of Giving Circles, the Long Beach City College Foundation Board of Governors, Vice President of the Foundation's Helping the Homeless Students Committee, and on the Service Committee of the Long Beach Rotary.

Commissioner Gordon-Peterson will serve a three-year term, beginning this month.

The other two Personnel Commissioners are: Jeff Kellogg who was appointed by the Classified Union; and Jeannine McManigal-Ball who was appointed by both the Board of Trustees and the Classified Union.





LBCC Icon Honored with Posthumous Doctorate

ngland's Durham University recently conferred an honorary Doctorate of Letters honoris causa to the late Mary Thoits, a much beloved leader for Long Beach City College lifelong learners.

The ceremony took place over Zoom on March 11, originating on the Northern England campus with the Vice-Chancellor, the University Warden and staff. Family, friends and students of Dr. Thoits were able to witness the ceremony from the United States.


Before her death at the age of 97 this past
January, Durham had alerted Mary of the
honor that would be bestowed on her. She
attended the University for her Senior year in
1946 because of her love of English literature.
She long credited the University for helping to
shape her into a free thinker, and later in life she
established a scholarship for Durham students.

Mary, who until 2015 was Director of the Senior Studies Program at LBCC, was pivotal in the development of lifelong learning programs for senior citizens within the District's communities. She officially retired from LBCC in 2015, but continued teaching part-time until the pandemic closure.

She led a rich life, which saw her boldly travel the world. Thoits was also part of the U.S. Women Airforce Service Pilots, having learned to fly planes at the age of 16 in response to being told that driving cars was not for women. She later spent 15 years in Europe as a Recreation Director for military personnel.

"Mary Thoits reinvented the educational opportunities for seniors," said Professor Maggi Dawn, Principal of St. Mary's College at Durham. "Right up to the end of her life Mary shared her energy with those around her. Her life and achievements personified the Durham ethos and her contribution to lifelong learning is of lasting significance both at Long Beach and here in Durham."

Mary's name will now be listed alongside other alumni such as Charlie Chaplin, in their honorary graduate book signed in their 200-year-old Durham Cathedral, where graduation ceremonies are traditionally held. This was the first posthumous ceremony carried out by Durham University in its 189-year history.


