CAMPUSBIRD TO TAKE FLIGHT AT LBCC

Beginning in the Spring of 2019, finding the way around both campuses of Long Beach City College will become easier as mobile-friendly maps come to life through CampusBird.

LBCC's buildings and grounds will be seen through a virtual mapping system providing 2D renderings using satellite imagery when one clicks the campus maps link located at the footer of the College's homepage. LBCC's Web Content and Electronic Media Coordinator Mo Wright has been working on the project for the better half of 2018, along with Instructional and Information Technology Services' Director Rob Carmen.

"CampusBird will provide Long Beach City College with a virtual mapping system, a mobile-friendly experience that delivers extensive location details, floorplans, and wayfinding all in the palm of your hand," said Wright.

LBCC NAMED FINALIST FOR PRESTIGIOUS BELLWETHER AWARD

First time in College history to be a finalist for an award that recognizes the most innovative community colleges in the country



Long Beach City College has been selected as a finalist for the prestigious 2019 Bellwether Award at the upcoming Community College Futures Assembly. The Bellwether Awards are the nation's most competitive and prestigious recognition awards given to community colleges to recognize outstanding and innovative programs or practices.

LBCC submitted its groundbreaking and innovative program entitled "The Long Beach College Promise 2.0" which provides seamless transfer to California State University, Long Beach and key industry partnerships that will provide internship and job placement opportunities for LBCC students allowing students to progress from high school all the way through to a job. LBCC is one of ten finalists in the Planning **Governance and Finance** category. A team representing LBCC will present at the Bellwether College Consortium Assembly in San Antonio, Texas this February, where the winner of each category will also be announced.

"The Long Beach Community College District Board of Trustees is so proud that such a respected consortium is recognizing the Long Beach College Promise 2.0," said LBCCD Board of Trustees President Sunny Zia. "This innovative enhancement is taking our original College Promise to a whole new level that will benefit our students and our community in groundbreaking ways. I'm looking forward to the opportunity to present Promise 2.0 on a national stage." LBCC is competing against more than 1,000 community college programs in the areas of: workforce development; instructional programs and services; and planning governance and finance. Ten community college programs in each of the three areas are invited to compete for the coveted Bellwether Award to this year's theme of "Creating a Legacy of Educational Success."

"This is the first time in LBCC history that we've been named a Bellwether finalist and we are thrilled. The Long Beach College Promise 2.0 will significantly transform our students' lives," said LBCC President Dr. Reagan Ferragamo Romali. "The legacy we have created here is nothing short of tremendous."

The Long Beach College Promise has led to a 22 percent increase in the number of LBUSD students who are college ready, and a 55 percent increase in enrollment from LBCC to CSULB.

Promise 2.0 offers a wide range of benefits. By attending LBCC, students have access to the Port of Long Beach and other industry partners and their vast internship and employment network. LBUSD seniors who attend LBCC the fall semester immediately following their spring 2019 graduation also receive two years of free tuition at LBCC (students should demonstrate successful progress towards a certificate, degree, or transfer each term).

For LBUSD seniors who enroll at LBCC and are interested in transferring to CSULB, Promise 2.0 also offers the following enhanced benefits:

- Dual advising under a
 "cohort" model from both
 LBCC Counselors and CSULB
 Academic Advisors.
- Access to special events and a student ID card for both LBCC and CSULB.
- Career exploration activities with both LBCC and CSULB.

The Bellwether College Consortium is a group of colleges charged with addressing the critical issues facing community colleges through applicable research and the promotion and replication of best practices addressing workforce development, instructional programs and services, and planning governance and finance. The Bellwether Award is sponsored by the Institute of Higher Education at the University of Florida, and focuses on cutting-edge, trendsetting programs.



HELPING LBCC'S STUDENTS IN NEED

The Small Business Development Center (SBDC) Network, hosted by Long Beach City College, has partnered with the City of Long Beach and the technology platform Startitup to help entrepreneurs with their small business ventures.

Startitup is a mobile app that gives entrepreneurs a step-by-step process for starting, managing and growing a successful small business. The City of Long Beach is the first city in the United States to sponsor the service and SBDC counselors will become mentors to the app users who want additional guidance for their start-up business. The app will also provide skills assessment, City-specific business launch templates, business vetting and planning module.

The app is free for the first 200 who download Startitup within Long Beach.

According to Sheneui Weber, LBCC's Chief Operating Officer of Workforce and Economic Development Division, it is a great opportunity for LBCC student entrepreneurs, faculty and staff. "If students are thinking about starting a side business, and want to know how to do things right, this lays it all out, walks you through the process and even provides live mentors," Weber said. "Research has shown that having a mentor helps success rates of new business, and the beauty of this technology is that it is 24/7 because we know that entrepreneurs don't sleep!"

The SBDC at LBCC is part of the nationwide SBDC program, the largest economic development program of the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA).

Accessing Startitup involves three steps; downloading the app for iPhone or Android; evaluating your strengths and areas for improvement; and connecting with a mentor to help start your business and execute a business plan.

A group of Long Beach City College representatives recently spent the day at the K-12 school on Santa Catalina Island.

The Avalon K-12 School has an enrollment of more than 600 students who face several challenges in furthering their educational opportunities after graduating high school.

Long Beach Community College District Board of Trustees Member Doug Otto (who represents the Island residents) was joined by LBCC Counselors Ann Marie Nunag and Elijah Sims, Associate Dean of Student Support Services Sonia De La Torre-Iniguez, Public Affairs & Marketing Executive Director Joshua Castellanos and Chief of Staff Jeff Wood. This team spent the day meeting with Avalon Mayor Anne Marshall, and discussed College opportunities and career exploration with Avalon students and school staff. "It was helpful to understand the unique 'island culture' and how that plays out in the ways that students see their future and approach their education," said De La Torre-Iniguez.

Nunag agrees with the importance of meeting the needs and tailoring LBCC services for the students on the island as they transition to College.

"When communicating with students during their sophomore or junior year, we can provide them with various information and assistance such as career exploration, financial aid, academic programs, and other pertinent information to ensure their preparation and transition from high school to college," she added.

The LBCC delegation sensed that while the community is small, there is excitement and optimism about their students attending LBCC in the future.

NIKE SELECTS LBCC FASHION STUDENT FOR DIVERSITY BY DESIGN APPRENTICESHIP

Ask Patrick Rivera what he did last summer and the Navy Reserve officer with a Bachelor's Degree in Political Science will tell you proudly that he learned how to sew at Long Beach City College.

The second year LBCC fashion student was selected by Nike for a full apprenticeship, complete with living expenses, moving costs and salary for six months at the Nike Oregon headquarters, starting this month.

Nike, through the Los Angeles Area Chamber of Commerce, contacted LBCC Workforce Development

Director Melissa Infusino as they searched for students to apply for its Diversity by Design Apprenticeship. Infusino, in turn, contacted LBCC's **Fashion Program** Director Pamela Knights about the opportunity. The Fashion Program's top students applied for the apprenticeship and participated in a series of intense competitions. "Fifteen of our outstanding students applied, and four were invited to a creative combine," said Knights. "Design research was required ahead of time, there were on-the-spot projects in which Nike provided the markers and templates but there were no computers allowed. There were workshops and briefings to compete in both footwear and apparel. It was all very intense."

Knights is very impressed with Rivera's talent and accomplishments throughout the last two years. Rivera said he "started from scratch" moving to the United States in 2014 from his native Philippines. Once he became a Navy Reserve officer, it was time to choose a career.

"I was feeling a little bit lost so I thought I should go back to school. LBCC has good reviews and was the closest school with a fashion program," said the Carson resident. "I always have had a drive to create something but I didn't know the right medium to express it. The journey to creating and seeing what I created, after long hours of sewing, what I have created is very fulfilling. This is a great honor to represent Long Beach City College at Nike."

Infusino was happy to play a small part with connecting Rivera and Nike.

"LBCC has some of the most talented and amazing students and I am thrilled to play a growing role in cultivating relationships with industry and economic development partners to create and connect with opportunities like the Nike Diversity by Design Apprenticeship," said Infusino.

JAMES MARTINEZ TAKES VETERANS' CONCERNS TO THE HILL

LBCC Veterans Services and Financial Aid Advisor James Martinez has been elected as a delegate to the National Association of Veterans' Program Administrators (NAVPA), an organization for those who are involved in the operation of veterans' affairs programs and/or the delivery of services to veterans as school certifying officials across the country.

Martinez will serve on the Board of Region VIII that represents Alaska, California, Hawaii, Idaho, Nevada, Oregon, Washington, American Samoa, Guam, Philippines, Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands, and the Wake Islands, working with an Education Committee that seek out the needs and challenges that are faced by the Veterans of today.

"Essentially what I will be doing is serving as a contact to the colleges within the region to help them determine what they need," said Martinez. "I say to them, 'If you had five minutes in front of a Congressman, what should they know about the state of the student veteran in this country?"

In February, Martinez will do just that as he heads to Washington D.C. with fellow delegates to present the legislation proposals that were a result of the 2018 NAVPA conference determinations.

Now in his sixth year working with LBCC's Veterans Services and Financial Aid, the LBCC Alum is enjoying his day-today work while now advocating for student veterans on a national level.

"I like that I am working with a population that is grateful, responsible and truly have a burning desire to learn and succeed," Martinez said. "I am glad that I get to help direct them so that they recognize the benefits and resources that are available to them."

Martinez, who also teaches English as an adjunct faculty at Compton College, sees housing as the biggest concern for today's student veteran.

"This concern coincides with the rest of the state," he said. "But LBCC Veterans Services has taken strides to assess the situation. We make multiple contacts with our incoming veterans and we try to connect them with outside resources to give them the stability they need to do well in school."
