MESSAGE FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT-PRESIDENT

Was that a commencement, or was that a commencement?!

The Long Beach City College Class of 2019 will go down in history for many reasons. Not only because they are a talented and dedicated group of students, but because I expect them to be the largest graduating class in LBCC history! And they participated in what I consider to be one of the best commencement ceremonies I've attended in my career.

The crowd was excited, the faculty were proud, the platform party was happy, the students were giddy, the stage looked beautiful, and the amazing Commencement Committee was exhausted! Our Valedictorian Jay Frisher and keynote speaker Veronica Miracle gave inspiring speeches that spoke to all of us. These are signs of a job well done.

It was the largest graduating classes in college history with more than 2,200 students who are candidates for Associate of Arts or Associate of Science degrees, and more than 800 students who are candidates for Certificates of Achievement. Three thousand students off to a better future thanks to Long Beach City College.

To think that 825 students walked the stage and yet we completed the ceremony with thoughtful speeches, pomp and circumstance in less than 2.5 hours! Amazing! I hope our students had as much fun as I did.

I want to sincerely thank every member of the Commencement Committee and the numerous members of our Student Life, Facilities, IITS, Public Affairs and Marketing, and the Office of the Superintendent-President for pulling off a wonderful event for my most favorite day of the year.

And there's more wonderful news! Of the approximately 3,000 LBCC students: 249 achieved Honors (3.500 - 3.749 cumulative grade point average); 139 students achieved High Honors (3.75 - 3.99 cumulative grade point average); and 69 students achieved Highest Honors, a perfect 4.00 cumulative grade point average. This is also the third year in a row we have seen a great increase in those with a 4.0 GPA - from 14 in 2017 to 44 in 2018 to 69 students this year. Wow! This could not have happened without the hard work of our faculty.

So, now it's time to turn to summer. Time to relax, rejuvenate and reflect on how we can continue with this great work into next academic year and beyond. Faculty who are off for the summer – see you on College Day at PCC on August 23! Those who are here this summer, enjoy those Fridays off (I know I will)!

LONG BEACH COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT CITIZENS' OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE SEEKS NEW MEMBER

Applications to become a member accepted through July 8

The Long Beach Community College District (LBCCD) Citizens' Oversight Committee (COC), which oversees District bond projects, is seeking a new member to represent a Bona-Fide Taxpayers' Association. Applications are being accepted now through July 8.

Applicants must be at least 18 years of age and reside within the LBCCD boundary, which includes the cities of Avalon, Lakewood, Long Beach and Signal Hill. Applicants also need to be current members of a Bona-Fide Taxpayers' Association, which is any current and active organization that advocates for taxpayers. This would include any community or neighborhood association, business improvement district, city commission, or any other city-sponsored group that is active within the District boundaries.

The LBCCD Board of Trustees will be asked to approve the new member at its July meeting. The term of service for the new appointee is retroactive to July 1, 2019, through June 30, 2021. The COC has two mandatory meetings each year and may schedule others as needed. The next COC meeting date is Monday, August 12, 2019.

The COC oversees both Measure E, a \$440 million bond measure approved by the voters in 2008, and Measure LB, an \$850 million bond measure approved by the voters in 2016. Funds are used exclusively for the construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation or replacement of LBCCD facilities, or the acquisition or lease of real property for use by the District.

LONG BEACH COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT CELEBRATES THE LARGEST GRADUATING CLASS IN HISTORY

More than 3,000 students to make up the class of 2019

It was the largest graduating classes in LBCC history this year with more than 2,200 students who are candidates for Associate of Arts or Associate of Science degrees, and more than 800 students who are candidates for Certificates of Achievement.









A few highlights from this year's Commencement Ceremony and re-cap of this academic year:

- More than 800 students participated in the annual Commencement Ceremony at Long Beach City College's Veterans Memorial Stadium on June 6.
- 249 LBCC students achieved Honors by earning a 3.500 - 3.749 cumulative grade point average; 139 students achieved High Honors (3.75 - 3.99 cumulative grade point average); and 69 students achieved Highest Honors, a perfect 4.00 cumulative grade point average.
- LBCC student Jay Frisher was selected as the 2019 Valedictorian. Frisher is a veteran The New York native came to Long Beach City College after tours with the U.S. Marines, to which he credits providing him with a different realization about life as a college student. His speech was to encourage his fellow students not to allow labels define their success.
- ABC7 broadcast journalist Veronica Miracle served as the keynote speaker and shared her story about her father who was sent to prison while she was in high school. She encouraged students to take charge and write their own story.
- Community member Loyd Wilcox represented the Long Beach City College alumni at the ceremony and presented his grandson, a fourth-generation Viking, his diploma.
- LBCC recognized its transfer students during a May 30 ceremony. Approximately 1,300 LBCC students transfer every year to four-year universities and colleges.
- More than \$1.2 million in scholarship funds was awarded to LBCC students at a ceremony on May 23.
