MESSAGE FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT-PRESIDENT

Dear Colleagues,

Let's wrap up 2018 with some good news!

It's all about the number two lately when it comes to the Long Beach College Promise. We launched Promise 2.0 and we're taking the Promise to the next level for our students. And it was wonderful to announce at the November Board of Trustees meeting that Long Beach City College will now offer two years of tuition-free education to all qualified Long Beach Unified School District students beginning fall of 2019. Because of the implementation of AB 19, all California residents will be able to attend a California Community College tuition free for the first year. The funding for the second year will be generously provided by the Long Beach City College Foundation!

I was also so very proud to announce a graduation increase of 26 percent in 2017-18 from the 2016-17 year. I knew I was shaking more hands at graduation last June, and I can't wait to see even more Vikings crossing the stage next June!

Our deficit reduction plan for the 2018-2019 first quarter resulted in an improvement of \$4.6 million, primarily thanks to your assistance with tightening our belts with travel, hospitality and supplies as well as reorganization and staffing changes. I am grateful for the cooperation I have received from each of you as we do what we can to ensure that not one single job is lost throughout these budget times.

Before this calendar year ends however, let's do a little celebrating. I am happy to announce that "President Romali's Sweet Holiday Afternoon Cookie Exchange" will be back! Join us at LAC on Wednesday, December 12, in T-1200 from 11:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m., and PCC on Thursday, December 13, in GG-238 from 12:30 p.m. -2:30 p.m. Details can be found in this newsletter, but we will be kicking it up a notch by asking for donations to the Viking Vaults. TWO YEARS YEARS FREE at LBCC

Long Beach City College announced that it will expand its tuition-free education to two years to all qualified Long Beach Unified School District students starting fall of 2019. The funding for the second year will be provided by the Long Beach City College Foundation.

With the implementation of **AB 19**, California residents are now able to receive one year free at any California Community College if they enroll full-time. All LBUSD graduates are automatically eligible for the second year tuition-free if they attend LBCC immediately after graduation.

The LBCC Foundation has provided the free semester to LBUSD graduates since 2008 with the start of the Long Beach College Promise, and then expanded into a full year in 2015.

The LBCC Foundation already provides more than \$1 million in scholarships to LBCC students every year. For more information on the LBCC Foundation and how to support the Long Beach College Promise, please visit LBCC.edu/Foundation.

Those not currently enrolled at LBCC can apply now online at LBCC.edu for the Winter Intersession that will run Jan. 2 – Feb. 5, 2019.

The Long Beach College Promise began as a collaboration between the Long Beach Unified School District, Long Beach City College and California State University, Long Beach to increase the success of local students in higher education. The City of Long Beach joined the partnership in 2014, and most recently the Port of Long Beach in September 2018.

CYBERSECURITY PROGRAM

LBCC DESIGNATED AS NATIONAL CENTER OF ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE IN CYBER DEFENSE EDUCATION

Long Beach City College has been named a National Center of Academic Excellence in Cyber Defense Education (CAE2Y) by the National Security Agency (NSA). LBCC is only the third California Community College to receive this designation.

The NSA reviewed LBCC's cyber security program last spring and determined that LBCC is providing rigorous instruction with the most current cyber security industry trends to students.

"It's anticipated that there will be 3.5 million unfilled cyber security jobs by 2021," said LBCC President Dr. Reagan Ferragamo Romali. "LBCC is wellpositioned as the best place for students to help fill this labor gap in the next three years. Certain cyber-defense positions within the government require a certificate from a National Center of Academic Excellence in Cyber Defense Education. Our students will now be eligible for these wellpaying jobs and be part of the team defending our government and other institutions from cyberattacks."

LBCC faculty and staff worked diligently over the past six years to build the program. It is one of the most robust cyber security programs in Southern California. Students can learn how to protect desktop and networks, configure Windows and Lennox servers, and learn about cyber forensics and ethical hacking. Upon completion, students would be eligible for entry level jobs in the IT and cyber security industries.

LBCC offers an Associate of Science in Computer Security and Networking, and a Certificate of Achievement in Computer Security and Networking. Once LBCC students graduate with an associate degree or the Certificate of Achievement, they will receive an additional certificate from the NSA and Department of Homeland Security (DHS) that indicates graduation from a CAE2Y program, which is required for many new cyber security positions within the government.

"LBCC is proud to receive this designation from the NSA as a CAE2Y institution," said Gene Carbonaro, Dean of the School of Career Technical Education. "We have an extremely vibrant cyber security program taught by our expert faculty who are constantly updating their own knowledge in this ever-changing field. Our teaching goes beyond the classroom including an active Cyber Security Club that participates in several competitions every year. This classification also means that our students would be eligible for exclusive scholarships and conferences that are only available to CAE2Y institutions."

FASHION PROGRAM STUDENT CUTTING THE CLOTH IN COMPETITION

Long Beach City College fashion student Pamela Kossek turned a donated bolt of fabric into an award-winning fashion design.

With a strong desire to enter something in the LBCC Fashion Show and limited funds, Kossek delved into the extra madras plaid fabric that was available in the **LBCC Fashion Design program**. With the donated fabric she designed a piece that captured first place in last May's Fashion Show in the Women's Contemporary Sportswear design, as well as a trophy and a \$1,000 scholarship from the California Fashion Foundation (CFF).

Kossek created a cotton and sheer silk organza bodice with a wrap skirt of tiered ruffles that reminds Fashion Program Director Pamela Knights of a Vivian Westwood design style.

"She really is an artist," said Knights. "We were so impressed that this student, with no finances, was able to utilize donated material from our fabric room and ended up winning one thousand dollars."

Kossek was recognized during a CFF event at the California Market Center where students presented their fashion designs. For the past five years, LBCC has been participating and competing in the CFF event against students from other community colleges and universities.

CFF was established in 1995 as a nonprofit association for the apparel and textile community.

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MAY-TREANOR INDUCTED INTO AVPFIRST WALL OF FAME

Long Beach City College director of Volleyball Operations Misty May-Treanor was recently named the first woman recipient to be inducted into the 2018 AVPFirst Wall of Fame by the Association of Volleyball Professionals (AVP).

"She has been a figurehead not only for beach volleyball and the AVP, but for women everywhere," said AVP President Donald Sun.

Since joining LBCC in 2016, the Olympic gold medalist and most decorated athlete in beach volleyball history has been busy building the College's new beach volleyball program.

"I'm very excited to help the players at LBCC and advance the volleyball program. I love the LBCC family and being able to have my family be a part of this school is amazing," said May-Treanor. "Both my parents coached at Santa Monica City when I was a toddler, and I remember those days and experiences with the athletes. I believe that helped shape me into who I am."

May-Treanor said that she is honored to be the first female to receive this award and loves what AVPFirst stands for by assisting grassroots and funding programs for kids, something she is committed to for future Vikings as well.

May-Treanor follows previous AVPFirst Wall of Fame inductees Sinjin Smith and Todd Roger. Founded in 1983, AVP beach volleyball organization facilitates national tournaments and promotes beach volleyball.
