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Students planning to **transfer** to a four-year college or university should refer to the ASSIST web site at [www.assist.org](http://www.assist.org) and **consult a counselor** before beginning a program of study. To meet with a counselor call 562-938-4561 for the LAC, or (562) 938-3920 for PCC. Students may also wish to visit the Transfer Center on either campus.

### Program Admissions Requirements

1. CNA: Must have completed a college level nursing assistant program within the past five (5) years, or a current State of California Nurse Assistant Certificate, or completion of a college level nursing fundamentals class within the past five years.
2. Reading Proficiency: Meet the current college graduation reading proficiency requirements. In order to do so, please contact the Liberal Arts campus counseling department at (562) 938-4560, or the Pacific Coast campus counseling department at (562) 938-3920 to schedule the LBCC Assessment test(s) and for a group meeting with a counselor
3. Math Proficiency: Qualify for Math 110 through the LBCC Assessment tests; or complete Math 815 or higher with a grade of "C" or better. If math classes were taken at another college, meet with a counselor to initiate an evaluation of the course for equivalency.
4. High School: Proof of high school graduation (12 years) is required. Official transcripts from a USA high school, or official General Educational Development (GED) certificate, or official transcripts from a college showing an AA/AS/BA/BS is required. All foreign transcripts must be evaluated by ACEI translation service.
5. Grade Point Average: If previous college work has been completed, a GPA of 2.0 must be achieved.
6. Information Meeting: Applicants must attend an information meeting prior to submitting an application. Meetings are held on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Tuesday of the month in C100A at 4:00 p.m. Please telephone (562) 938-4166 to verify date and time.
7. Prerequisite Courses: All prerequisite courses must be completed prior to entering the program. However, students may apply for the program DURING THE 1<sup>ST</sup> WEEK OF January & June. Please call Nursing office for exact dates. Prerequisites must have been completed within the previous five years.8. Background Check: Vocational nursing students must obtain a clear criminal background check prior to the first day of clinical experience. Conviction of a crime may prevent progression to clinical practice or licensure. Vocational nursing graduates send fingerprints with the application for licensure.

### Program Information

1. Applications, along with all required documents, may be submitted the tenth to twelfth week of each semester to the office staff of the School of Health and Science. Selection for admission to the next beginning class will be by lottery. If more students apply than can be accepted, selection will be based upon the student's science GPA.
2. We offer a full-time 2 ½ semester (or 45 weeks) program (See required courses sequence for summer 2011 disclaimer). The program admits students twice a year () in March and October only.
3. While waiting for the program to start, the student should take any of the following courses to strengthen reading, language or mathematics skills and prepare for a nursing career: AH 60 (Medical Terminology), AH 210 (Math for Medications), BIO 60 Lab (Human Biology Lab), CDECE 47 (Human Development), COUNS 1 (Orientation for College Success), ENGL 105 (Fundamentals of Writing), LEARN 11 (Learning and Academic Strategies), MATH 110 (First Course in Algebra), PSYCH 1 (Introduction to Psychology), and SOCIO 1 (Introduction to Sociology).

## Career Opportunities

Completion of the Vocational Nursing Program qualifies the student to take the national licensing examination for Vocational nurses (NCLEX-PN/VN). A Licensed Vocational Nurse (Practical Nurse in other states) is prepared for employment in ambulatory care settings (physician's office, clinics); long term care (skilled nursing facilities, convalescent and residential care); rehabilitation facilities, acute care hospitals, psychiatric facilities, hospice, and in the home. A Licensed Vocational Nurse is qualified to apply to the Long Beach City College Associate Degree Nursing Program for the Career Ladder LVN-RN Program.

### **INFORMATION REGARDING NURSE ASSISTANT CERTIFICATION**

Completion of the prerequisite courses of VN 215 and 215L qualifies the successful student to apply to the State of California Department of Health Services Aide and Technician Unit for permission to take the required written and performance test for Certified Nurse Assistant. Teachers of the VN 215 course will assist students with the application process. No application fees are charged by the Aide and Technician Unit, but the applicant will have to pay a fee of \$56.00 for a criminal background check. A fee of \$90.00 is charged by the agencies that provide the written and performance testing.

Students planning to enter the vocational nursing program are strongly advised to obtain the Certified Nurse Assistant status. Upon graduation from the vocational nursing program, licensing is delayed at least three months, and most graduates need to find employment as Certified Nursing Assistants with the option of moving into Licensed Vocational Nurse category when the license is in hand.

## Program Mission and Outcomes

Prepare students for entry-level vocational nursing licensure and competent practice.

Outcomes:

- Synthesize theories and principles necessary for licensure as a vocational nurse.
- Development of critical thinking skills in preparation for the student's first job in vocational nursing.
