

Catalina Island Students Gain College Access Through Dual Enrollment Day





Long Beach City College (LBCC) brought the Long Beach College Promise to Avalon during the Catalina Island College Promise Dual Enrollment Day. Board of Trustees Vice President Dr. Ennette Morton, Superintendent-President Dr. Mike Muñoz, and college leaders met with Mayor Anni Marshall and Avalon TK-12 Principal Emma Peguero to celebrate expanded college opportunities for Catalina Island students. With support from LBCC staff, students enrolled in nine LBCC courses across disciplines such as history, sociology, psychology, and music.

\$2 Million Endowment Supports Future Nurses

The St. Mary Medical Center Foundation Board approved a \$2 million endowment to support the Long Beach City College Nursing Program, in collaboration with the LBCC Foundation. The endowment will provide ten annual scholarships of \$2,500 each to students pursuing careers in nursing, helping cover tuition, books, uniforms, healthcare fees, and other program-related expenses.

The scholarship program strengthens LBCC's commitment to preparing skilled nurses who will make a significant impact on healthcare. The first St. Mary Medical Center Endowed Scholarship was awarded to Hilary De La Cruz, a first-generation student dedicated to helping others and advancing her education in nursing.



Temple Family Charitable Foundation Commits \$1 Million to DSPS Center



Long Beach City College received an extraordinary \$1 million-gift from the Temple Family Charitable Foundation in support of the Disabled Student Programs and Services (DSPS) Center.

In recognition of this generous commitment, LBCC held a renaming ceremony to officially dedicate the space as the Temple Family Charitable Foundation DSPS Center. This contribution reflects the Temple Family's continued dedication to expanding access, inclusion, and success for students with disabilities at LBCC.

Celebrating Global Connections at LBCC



Long Beach City College and Sister Cities of Long Beach proudly hosted the first in-person awards ceremony for the Digital Pen Pal Program. This unique initiative is designed to help students build meaningful global friendships despite geographic and time barriers. Throughout the program, students exchanged ideas, stories, and perspectives. Their work culminated in a scholarship project evaluated on creativity, connection, quality, and relevance.

The ceremony also honored participants in the Young Artists and Authors Showcase, whose works celebrated this year's theme, "Friendship: The Heartbeat of Global Peace." Their art, poetry, essays, and music illustrated how connection and understanding can unite students around the world.



Library Honors Trailblazer Bobbie Smith



The Liberal Arts Campus Library was rededicated as the Bobbie Smith Library, honoring LBCC's first African American librarian and a pioneer for literacy, equity, and justice. Bobbie Smith, who served from 1970 to 1992, held roles as department head, Academic Senate President, and Faculty Union President, leaving a legacy as an educator, activist, and leader. She also made history as the first African American woman elected president of the Long Beach Unified School District Board of Education.

Beyond the classroom, the trailblazing librarian advocated for social change through organizations such as the NAACP, the National Council of Negro Women, and other community groups. The renaming, led by LBCC librarians and unanimously approved by the Board of Trustees, also launched the Bobbie Smith Scholarship for Library Science students. The library now stands as a lasting tribute to her service, perseverance, and dedication to education and community.

Aquatics Center Dedicated to Legendary Coach Monte Nitzkowski



Long Beach City College dedicated its Aquatics Center in honor of the late Monte Nitzkowski, a decorated athlete, revered coach, and influential figure in U.S. swimming and water polo. Coach Nitzkowski led LBCC to 32 conference water polo championships and 12 swim titles over 34 years, including an eight-season undefeated streak.

He and his wife Barbara were strong advocates for Title IX, helping launch collegiate women's water polo programs

nationwide and promoting equal opportunities for female athletes. Coach Nitzkowski also guided the U.S. Men's Water Polo Team to Olympic bronze in 1972 and silver in 1984.

The naming of the Monte Nitzkowski Aquatics Center is supported by an endowment through the LBCC Foundation, ensuring lasting resources for student athletes and a legacy that will inspire generations.

Record Participation Marks Milestone for Viking Summer Voyage



Long Beach City College's Viking Summer Voyage reached a new milestone with 425 students completing the program—its largest cohort to date. The eight-day, in-person summer transition program prepares incoming students for college success through a blend of academic readiness, career exploration, and student engagement activities. The program's success underscores LBCC's ongoing commitment to innovative student support initiatives that build a strong foundation for academic achievement.

LBCC Breaks Ground on Award-Winning Student Center to Redefine Campus Life



LBCC celebrated the groundbreaking of its new Building E College Center. This is an ambitious \$102 million project that will become the heart of student life on the Liberal Arts Campus. The future student center, recognized with the prestigious *Gold Nugget Award for Best Educational Project* from the Pacific Coast Builders Conference (PCBC), exemplifies excellence in design and innovation in higher education facilities.

The three-story, 62,823-square-foot center will unite key student services under one roof, including Student Life, Basic Needs, Viking Vault, the Family Center, International Center, Student Affairs, First Year Experience, and the Social Justice Intercultural Center. The facility will also feature a campus cafeteria, amphitheater, outdoor gathering spaces, and flexible event areas.



With construction beginning in July 2025 and completion anticipated in Fall 2027, the building is designed to achieve LEED Gold Certification, reflecting LBCC's commitment to sustainability and equity.

It is funded by Measure LB, which was passed by voters in Avalon, Lakewood, Long Beach, and Signal Hill in 2016.

Long Beach City College has earned national recognition for its leadership in creating an inclusive and equitable campus environment, receiving the American Association of Community Colleges (AACCC) Award of Excellence for Advancing Institutional Equity and Belonging. The award, presented at the AACCC's annual conference in Nashville, highlights LBCC's commitment to embedding equity and belonging into every aspect of its operations.

Under the leadership of Superintendent-President Dr. Mike Muñoz, LBCC has achieved historic milestones, including a 43-point increase in students' sense of belonging, record-high enrollment, and a 50% improvement in the three-year completion rate. The college has also closed racial equity gaps in transfer-level math and English completion while expanding basic needs services, including food, housing, and mental health support.

As a Hispanic-Serving Institution serving a diverse student population, LBCC continues to strengthen initiatives like the DEIA Public Art Advisory Group, expanded cultural celebrations, equitable teaching programs, and employee resource groups. Partnerships such as the on-campus Boys & Girls Club program further support student-parents and youth.

Celebrating Excellence: Honoring LBCC's Outstanding Employees

Long Beach City College proudly recognizes several employees whose achievements this year earned prestigious state and national acclaim.

Visual artist and professor Carolyn Castaño received the esteemed 2025 Guggenheim Fellowship, one of only 32 Fine Arts recipients selected nationwide, honoring her influential work exploring identity, migration, and landscape.

Librarian Shamika Simpson was named the 2025 Distinguished Librarian by the Ethnic & Multicultural Information Exchange Round Table for her national leadership in advancing inclusive library services. She was also selected as a featured teaching librarian by the Association of College and Research Libraries.

LBCC also celebrated Mary Aja, longtime head athletic trainer, on her induction into the California Community College Athletic Trainer Association Hall of Fame, recognizing her decades of service and impact on student-athletes.

Additionally, Superintendent-President Dr. Mike Muñoz was selected as *Excelencia* in Education's inaugural President in Residence, a national leadership role supporting institutions advancing Latina/o/x student success.

Together, these honorees exemplify LBCC's commitment to excellence, innovation, and student-centered leadership.



Celebrating LBCC's 2025 Hall of Fame

Long Beach City College and the LBCC Foundation celebrated outstanding alumni and community leaders at the 2025 Hall of Fame ceremony on September 18. This year's honorees included three exceptional alumni: legendary singer Jenni Rivera, inducted posthumously as the first alumna in Hall of Fame history; acclaimed singer and actor Jennifer Kumiyma; and respected attorney and community advocate Norm Rasmussen.

The evening also recognized LBCC Foundation Distinguished Awardees: Dr. Alisia Kirkwood (Campus Friend Award), the Boys and Girls Clubs of Long Beach (Community Service Award – Organization), Debra Peterson (Community Service Award – Individual), and Nathalia Miyamura ("The Blaine Edward Mansfield" Student Service Award).

Established in 1972, the Hall of Fame is LBCC's signature recognition event, honoring alumni, students, and community members whose achievements have brought lasting prestige to the college and the greater Long Beach community.




Partnering to Empower Parenting Students

Long Beach City College was selected as one of only two California community colleges to participate in the *Empowering Single Mothers & Parenting Students Community of Practice*, led by the California Alliance for Student Parent Success and EdTrust-West.

This two-year initiative brings together LBCC leaders from Financial Aid, Institutional Effectiveness, Basic Needs, and the Child Development Center to gather data, share best practices, and develop targeted action plans that improve outcomes for parenting students. Through six intensive sessions focused on information gathering, debriefing, and cross-collaboration, LBCC is working to address key barriers such as childcare access, financial aid awareness, and basic needs support.

Honored for Student Parent Success



Long Beach City College was honored with the California Student Parent Summit Award in the "IMPLEMENT" category, recognizing LBCC's outstanding efforts to support student parents. This award celebrates institutions that have successfully implemented policies and practices addressing the needs of families, established comprehensive support systems, and demonstrated measurable impact on educational outcomes and degree completion.

Advancing Latina/o/x Student Achievement

As a Seal of Excelencia-certified institution, LBCC continues to lead nationally in promoting Latina/o/x student success. In 2025, LBCC served as a coaching partner for Northeast Lakeview College in San Antonio, Texas, offering strategic feedback and guidance as the college pursued its own Seal of Excelencia certification. Through this collaboration, LBCC is sharing best practices, mentoring peer institutions, and shaping national efforts to advance equity and inclusion in higher education by reinforcing the college's mission to ensure every student can thrive and succeed.



Beach Volleyball Team Earns Conference Honors



The Long Beach City College beach volleyball team finished the 2025 season with six athletes earning All-South Coast Conference (SCC) recognition. Sophomores Enaya Vaielua and Tyreana Allen captured the SCC Individual Pairs Championship, while Mikayla Curry and Kaylani Moncada earned First Team honors. Four additional players—Ryannah Gagau, Alexandra Rosquin, Ryleeh Tuaolo, and Camille Agrupis—were named to the Second Team, highlighting the team's depth and competitive strength under Head Coach Tyler Jackson.

Women's Softball Shines with Record Season with Coach of the Year



The Women's Softball program had a standout year in 2025, highlighted by Head Coach Megan Martinez being named South Coast Conference Coach of the Year. Under her leadership, LBCC captured the Regional Championship with a remarkable 38-4 record—the team's best season since 2002.
