

AB-2364 Special Admission Nonresident Tuition Exemption Request For Eligible Dual Enrollment Part-Time Students

The term "Special Admission" student refers to students **concurrently enrolled in K-12 or adult school** who have been recommended by the principal/designated official of the pupil's school, have parental/legal guardian permission (students 18 years of age or older don't require parent/guardian permission) to attend a community college, and who enroll in 11 or fewer units per semester.

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for in state tuition.

- This exemption does **not** apply to special admission students enrolled full-time (12 units or more)
- This exemption does <u>not</u> apply to students who would be precluded from qualifying for AB540 nonresident tuition exemption upon graduation from high school (students on most nonimmigrant visas like F, J, or B). Students with T and U visas are eligible for this exemption.
- Students receiving this exemption do not receive resident status for the purpose of financial aid. Students are still determined to be non-residents of California, but are billed California in-state tuition. Students are exempt from nonresident tuition under this law.

AB 2364, Holden. Public postsecondary education: community colleges: exemption from nonresident tuition.

Existing law establishes the California Community Colleges, under the administration of the Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges, as one of the segments of public postsecondary education in this state. Existing law establishes community college districts throughout the state, and authorizes them to operate campuses and provide instruction to students. Existing law authorizes community college districts to admit nonresident students, and requires that nonresident students be charged a nonresident tuition fee unless an exemption is applicable. Existing law authorizes a community college district to exempt from all or parts of the fee a special part-time student admitted pursuant to a specified concurrent or dual enrollment program.

This bill instead would require a community college district to exempt a special part-time student, other than a nonimmigrant alien, as defined, from paying all or parts of the fee if that student is admitted pursuant to one of additionally specified concurrent or dual enrollment programs. Because the bill would require community college districts to determine whether students qualify for exemption from nonresident tuition, it would constitute a state-mandated local program.

The California Constitution requires the state to reimburse local agencies and school districts for certain costs mandated by the state. Statutory provisions establish procedures for making that reimbursement. This bill would provide that, if the Commission on State Mandates determines that the bill contains costs mandated by the state, reimbursement for those costs shall be made pursuant to these statutory provisions.
