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



Student Honored with Statewide Leadership Award

LBCC student April Brown was one of four California Community Colleges student leaders to receive the annual Student Leadership Award in April during the 2024 Student Senate for California Community Colleges. The award recognizes students who are dedicated to equity and inclusion on campus and in their communities.

April served as the president of the Umoja Club, a student organization dedicated to promoting equity and inclusivity for Black students. Among her many accomplishments, she was critical in securing more than \$17,000 for the club, the most funding any equity-driven student club has earned in the college's history.

To advance the Equitable Baccalaureate Attainment

goal of California Community Colleges Vision 2030 strategic plan, she organized a leadership tour of the University of California, Riverside for Umoja Scholar students, a Spring 2024 college tour in San Diego and actively recruited students to tour Historically Black Colleges and Universities to discover transfer opportunities for four-year degrees.

April also works in the college's Welcome Center assisting students and connecting them with what they need to succeed.

Twenty-four students were nominated for the award, which included a \$1,250 scholarship.





Voters ushered in a transformative era for LBCC by approving the Measure AC bond in 2024, paving the way for modernized campuses, innovative learning spaces, and enhanced student support.

In November, nearly 70% of Avalon, Lakewood, Long Beach, and Signal Hill voters approved Measure AC, achieving one of the highest success rates of any bond measure in the state.

rates of any bond measure in the state. The \$990 million bond measure will provide critical upgrades and modernization for LBCC's campuses. This landmark investment will enhance campus facilities, create state-of-the-art learning environments, and fund affordable housing for students, establishing LBCC as a model for the college of the future. Future improvements include: creating affordable housing for students, ensuring stability and support for students in need; renovating vocational classrooms and labs,

including facilities for nursing and healthcare professions; and expanding accessibility for students with disabilities and supporting facilities for returning veterans.

LBCC updated the Facilities Master Plan that will guide construction for the next 25 years.

LBCC also made significant progress on two major construction projects - Building G
Performing Arts Complex at the Liberal Arts
Campus (LAC) and Building MM Construction
Trades 2 at the Trades, Technology, and Community
Learning Campus (formerly known as the
Pacific Coast Campus).

The newly renovated Coffee Pavilion at LAC is now open, offering students a vibrant outdoor space to gather, enjoy coffee, and unwind.

Black Student Success Center Grand Opening



LBCC celebrated the grand opening of its first Black Student Success Center with a ribbon-cutting ceremony in April, marking a significant milestone for the 13% of LBCC's student population who identify as Black/African American. The Center provides a vital space for support and belonging, celebrating the African Diaspora while offering essential services to advance Black students' personal and academic success and address racial inequities.

A standout feature of the center is a vibrant indoor mural honoring Black/African American heroes, including Long Beach icons Doris Topsy-Elvord and Duke Givens, alongside civil rights leaders such as Angela Davis and Malcolm X.

Celebrating the New North Long Beach Higher Education Center

LBCC, in partnership with the City of Long Beach, celebrated the grand opening of the North Long Beach Higher Education Center in May with a ceremonial ribbon cutting, open house, and mural dedication.

The Center serves as a physical location in North Long Beach where all residents can access education and career resources, tuition-free non-credit courses, small business support services, and workforce training opportunities that cater to diverse needs and aspirations. The Center also provides a cutting-edge computer lab to residents for classes or enrollment. The City's Department of Economic Development, the City's Workforce Bureau, Pacific Gateway Workforce Innovation Network, and LBCC staff oversee Center operations and work alongside community partners to conduct programming.

The vibrant mural adorning the west wall exterior, created by the Puente Latino Association, enhances the Center's façade, and recently received a prestigious Gold Davey Award for its outstanding design and community impact.

Trades, Technology, and Community Learning Campus Celebrates 75th Anniversary

Former Pacific Coast Campus Marks Milestone with a New Name



In 2024 LBCC marked the 75th anniversary of the newly re-branded LBCC Trades, Technology, and Community Learning Campus (TTC), formerly known as the Pacific Coast Campus (PCC). Established in 1949, the campus has long been a center for career education and free community education.

LBCC hosted a free community celebration at the TTC campus, featuring live entertainment, food, games, commemorative gifts, interactive booths, tours, and demonstrations from LBCC's trades

programs. It provided an opportunity for the community to explore all that the campus has to offer, while also honoring its rich history, legacy, and bright future.

Originally the site of Hamilton Junior High School, which suffered significant damage from the 1933 earthquake, the campus became part of LBCC (founded in 1927) in 1949. The campus was first established as the Business Technology Division and later renamed the Pacific Coast Campus.





Over the years, the campus has expanded its programs to align with local industry demands and create opportunities for personal and professional growth.

Today, TTC is at the home of various signature programs such as advanced automotive technology, horticulture, welding, and construction.

The LBCC Labor Center was opened at TTC in 2020 as the first labor center in the harbor region to provide students with events and training in

partnership with industry and union leaders. TTC is also home to the Port of Long Beach's Maritime Center of Excellence at LBCC which provides professional development for individuals who are interested in careers in the supply chain and logistics sectors. Additionally, TTC remains a vital resource for the community by offering English as a Second Language courses and many other free, non-credit classes.

At TTC, there is truly something for everyone.



LBCC Regains Large College Status



LBCC regained "large college" status after declines caused by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Campus leadership and staff worked hard to boost enrollment with comprehensive outreach campaigns, determined efforts to improve college completion, and the creation of an inclusive/anti-racist environment. These efforts have led to LBCC being one of the few community colleges in California to recapture their pre-COVID enrollment numbers. In California, the state considers a community college to be large if it has at least 20,000 full-time equivalent students (FTES). Large college status means LBCC can expand resources, enhance academic offerings, and better serve the diverse student population. This new milestone includes an additional \$2 million annually from the California Community College Chancellor's Office.

LBCC's 2023-2024 academic year enrollment surged to a record-breaking 38,696 students (or 20,033 full-time equivalent students). In Fall 2023, LBCC saw a 10% increase in Black student enrollment and the highest number of new indirect matriculant students in credit classes in the last five years.

Building a Resilient Future Through Three Transformative Grants

In 2024, LBCC secured over \$15 million in grants to support returning students, expand affordable housing, and train climate-resilient professionals.

In January, Congressman Robert Garcia (CA-42) announced that LBCC will receive a \$4 million Postsecondary Student Success Grant (PSSG) awarded by the Department of Education. The grant will fund the new Success and Completion Achievement Network (SCAN) program, which will create a structured support system to help students who did not enroll in college immediately after high school by assisting them to successfully navigate the college system.

In December, Congresswoman Nanette Barragán (CA-44) announced \$1 million in federal funding that will help with building the North Long Beach Student Housing and Higher Education Complex. The development will include a mixed-use complex with affordable student housing, a large multipurpose community room, study rooms, shared kitchens, and support services on site. Affordable housing will be available to low-income LBCC students and open to students with dependents.

LBCC also received more than \$10 million in climate workforce grants, including \$9.5 million from NOAA and \$750,000 from the California Municipal Utilities Association, to train students for careers in climate resilience and sustainability.






