The International Student Office staff at Long Beach City College helps international students with personal concerns and keeps them informed and in full compliance with the basic laws and procedures regulating them, established by the college, the DHS (Department of Homeland Security) and the community.

The Foreign Student Advisor (FSA) is the liaison between international students and college officials, instructors, staff, students and the surrounding community. The FSA will refer students to other college departments which are important to the student’s education and well-being.

The FSA will supply students with any necessary DHS forms and will assist students in completing the forms.

It is generally not necessary to make an appointment to see the FSA. However, some documents require paperwork that may take several days to prepare. In addition, the days close to registration are often very busy and students are encouraged to make appointments to see the FSA at those times to avoid long waits.

All discussions with the FSA are confidential. The FSA does not report the contents of advising appointments to DHS and will not report information of a private nature to other administrators or faculty on campus.

How Should I Behave?

We encounter cultural differences in many aspects of our daily life, including in how to behave in American offices. In some countries, office doors are always kept closed. You must knock before you enter. In other places, you must have an appointment before you can visit an office. Here at Long Beach City College, office procedures vary slightly from one office to the next, and on the surface, we seem to be very informal. However, there are expectations and there are certain rules of behavior that apply everywhere.

1. Always check with a receptionist before entering a staff member's office. Sometimes the receptionist is a staff secretary; other times, the receptionist is a student assistant. These people are trained to help you with limited items. If they cannot help you, you can be sure that they will get you in to see someone at a higher level who can assist you.
2. Over time, you may come to know the International office staff and the International counselor very well. You may feel comfortable just walking in to our offices, because our doors are almost always open. However, this is considered rude. You should first check with the receptionist. If no receptionist is available to help you, you may walk into the office and ask for help only if the person you want to see is not talking on the telephone and is not talking to another person.
3. Sometimes, you will see that the person you want to speak with is on the phone. It may look like that person is on hold, and you may think it is OK to ask a quick question. Stop! It is not OK. The person may be listening to a message or to another person talking. It is rude to interrupt someone who is on the telephone.
4. Sometimes, you have a very short question that you need help with. The person you need to speak to is helping another student, and that meeting is taking a long time. You may want to interrupt for a minute just to ask your question, or to see when it might be OK to come back. Stop! It is not OK. It is rude to interrupt a meeting between a staff member and a student or another person. It is considered rude to do this even if your interruption is very brief. You must be patient and wait until the person you want to visit is free. You can always make an appointment with the receptionist to come back at another time.
5. Some students stand at the office door or next to a staff member's desk, waiting for them to finish their meeting. This is very impolite. You need to wait in the reception area, in a chair, or away from the meeting in progress. Make sure that the receptionist knows you are waiting so that you can be helped next.
6. Must you make an appointment to see LBCC staff? It all depends! If you want to see Judy Oh, you must make an appointment with the counseling staff. She offers office

hours when you can see her without an appointment for a simple question. You must check her office door to see when she will hold her office hours. Even when she doesn't have a student in her office, she has many projects that she must work on for the college and she may not be available to see you. ALWAYS check with the receptionist first.

In the International Student Office, you usually need an appointment to see Denise, but generally do not need an appointment to see Dolores. You MUST check with the receptionist before going in to see either of them.

We hope these tips are helpful, and will make it easier for you to understand our office culture, and behave properly in it.

Campus Security

It is the policy of the Long Beach Community College District to maintain a safe and secure environment for its students, staff, and visitors. Safety and security requires that everyone on campus be alert, aware, and responsible.

The Long Beach Police Department provides police services to the Long Beach Community College District through its City College Unit. The City College Unit is comprised of an assigned Lieutenant, four police officers, and 16 security officers that are assigned to both the Liberal Arts Campus and the Pacific Coast Campus.

Contact the Police Department with any emergencies such as crimes in progress, medical aid, or any incident requiring **immediate** police / security response.

Contact the Police Department for questions or problems regarding security, lost and found items, thefts or other crimes. The LAC office is located north of the Library in Parking Lot C. Business hours are Monday through Friday, 8am to 5pm. After business hours call the General Service number or 911 (9911 for on-campus phones) for an emergency.

Evening Safety Escorts

Escorts are available to students at both LAC and PCC. Students should call the City College Unit through the General Service number to arrange for an escort to meet them on campus.

These rules are enforced to ensure the rights of permit holders, as well as to provide for the safety of people and property:

1. Parking permits are **required at all times** in LAC and PCC parking lots. Parking permits are purchased each semester during registration. After registration, permits may be purchased from the Cashier's Office at either campus. For students who do not wish to purchase a semester parking permit, one-day parking permits are available at both campuses. Parking permit machines at LAC are

located on the west side of parking lot 'J', on Lew Davis, and lot 'E'. The PCC Machine is located on the south side of parking lot 3. Meter Parking is available in Lot F, G, H, and on Lew Davis at LAC. Meters are available Lot 2 at PCC. There are also 30 minute visitor parking zones along the north curb of Carson Street for LAC.

2. Semester parking permits must be attached to the rear view mirror so that it is visible from the front of the vehicle. One-day parking permits must be placed in plain view on the vehicle dashboard with the permit facing upward. Students who are having difficulty displaying a permit should go to the College Police Trailer for assistance. Students driving a convertible-type vehicle can obtain a special convertible permit from the LAC College Police trailer, in lot 'C.' This special convertible permit can only be obtained after the purchase of a semester parking permit.
3. Student permits and daily permits do not authorize parking in staff or other reserved parking spaces except where posted otherwise.
4. Parking is available on a first-come, first-served basis.
5. All vehicles must be parked between the lines of a designated parking space only. Backing into parking stalls is not permitted.
6. A permit does not guarantee a parking space in the parking lot of choice. You are advised to allow ample time to find parking. At LAC, there is additional parking in the Veterans Stadium parking lot.
7. Citations are issued by the Long Beach Police Department to automobiles, motorcycle, and mopeds that do not display a properly placed, current parking permit. Students parked in staff or other specially designated areas will also be cited.
8. Students may not double park nor circle the parking lots to wait for a parking space.
9. No adjustments will be made for parking citations at the Long Beach Police Department - College Unit. Individuals wishing to contest citations must do so by following your instructions on your citation or by calling (562) 570-6822.
10. Motorcycles and mopeds are to be parked only in areas specifically posted for their use. Operators must purchase a current semester parking permit and keep it in their possession. Motorcycles and mopeds may not be driven on campus or parked on sidewalks. Violators will be cited.
11. Students, staff, or faculty with state-issued disabled placards are to park in the marked handicapped spaces. If a handicap space is not available, parking is allowed in any other student or staff space. Disabled permits are not valid in carpool or other reserved spaces.

Regulations pertaining to parking can vary from lot to lot. It is the responsibility of the driver to read the parking regulations that are posted at the entrance of each parking lot.

Frequently Asked Questions

I don't have anywhere to live, or I have to move right away. Who can help me?

The International Student Office has apartment listings and may have host families, although host families are usually in short supply.

Do I need a parking permit? Where can I buy one?

You DO need a parking permit to park on campus at all times. With your permit, you will only be allowed to park in spaces that are not marked "Faculty", "Carpool" or "Handicapped". Pay for your permit when you register for classes, or purchase a day permit from one of the dispensers in the parking lots around campus. When you register, you will be asked if you want "parking". If you register in person, you will be given your permit in the registration room. If you register on-line or by telephone, your permit will be mailed to you.

How do I get my picture/student i.d. (Identification Card)?

After you pay for your registration, take your receipt to the E building (Student Center). Just inside the main door, to the right, is a counter. Present your receipt and ask for your i.d. Your picture will be taken on the spot, so make sure you look good!

How do I get my books?

Take your registration receipt to the bookstore. You may want to take an experienced student with you, or ask a bookstore employee for help. Go to the section which has books for your subject. Cards hanging on the shelf will indicate the class and the *section number* which uses each book. Be sure to check your section number! Sometimes, instructors for the same class but different sections will choose different books.

Now, you can avoid the long bookstore lines by ordering your books on the internet. Sign on to www.lbcc.bkstre.com and follow the instructions.

How do I add a class before the first day of the semester?

First, check your schedule book to see if the last day to register for classes has passed. Next, log on to PeopleSoft, or contact the class professor to see if the class is still open. If it is, you can add the class on-line, or go to walk-in registration (which may be either downstairs in the E building, or in the Admissions Office in the A building). Fill in the add slip and add your class.

What if the class I want has a wait list or is closed?

You still may have a chance to get in to the class. Go to the class on the first day. (The time and location of each class is listed in your schedule book.) Get there a few minutes early. Before class begins, tell the instructor you would like to add the class. Usually, the instructor will wait until the break or the end of the class, and then will decide if there are spaces for more students. If he or she decides to add you, you will be given a “permission number”. You can use this number to add the class on-line.

How do I drop a class?

If dropping the class will cause you to fall below 12 units, you need to see the academic counselor, Judy Oh, *before* you drop the class. Her office is in the A building, room A155. If Judy is not available, see Denise Kinsella in the ISO. You will need a certificate to allow you to take fewer than 12 units while still keeping your F-1 status.

Next, fill out an add/drop slip. These are available in the Admissions Office or in building E during walk-in registration times. Complete the slip and submit it to the person at registration. (Admissions or Building E.) You may also drop a class by following the appropriate links in PeopleSoft (OLE On-line Registration).

Be sure to check the various drop dates in your schedule book. If you drop *or swap classes* AFTER the last refund date, you WILL NOT get a refund!

What if I’m still confused?

Sometimes it’s hard to figure out new procedures from written instructions. If you aren’t sure how to do something, come to the International Student Office. We’ll be happy to help you!

Where can I work?

If you are a full-time student in the regular college program and this is your first or second semester, you are only allowed to work on-campus, at LBCC. There is no central job listing at LBCC. The best way to find out about an opening is to visit the offices on campus and ask if they’re looking for anyone. I recommend writing your information (name, phone number, skills) on an index card to leave at offices where you are interested in working so they can call you if a job becomes available in the future.

At the beginning of the semester, offices *sometimes* call the International Student Office to inform us of openings. We write the information on the small white board opposite the main desk as you come into the ISO.

For more information about work, including tips for finding a job on campus, a list of offices which have hired International students in the past, and information about working off campus in the future, check the Work Opportunities and Taxes Section in the orientation handbook.

Campus Clubs

To help students discover the variety of clubs, the Office of Student Affairs schedules a Join-A-Club Day each fall and spring semester at both the Liberal Arts Campus and the Pacific Coast Campus. The mid-day events include booths, food, entertainment, games, brochures, information and most importantly, the chance to talk to current members about how you could benefit from the club, and how the club can be better with you as a member.

For students who recognize a need for a new club or wish to revive a former club, the Office of Student Affairs offers guidance, information and referrals. Staff members and faculty are willing to help students form any new club, and can put students in touch with potential sponsors, resources, information and other students with similar goals.

To form a club, students should follow these simple guidelines:

1. Obtain signatures from 15 students with [College Services Cards](#)
2. Gain the sponsorship of a faculty or staff member
3. Draft a constitution, using models provided

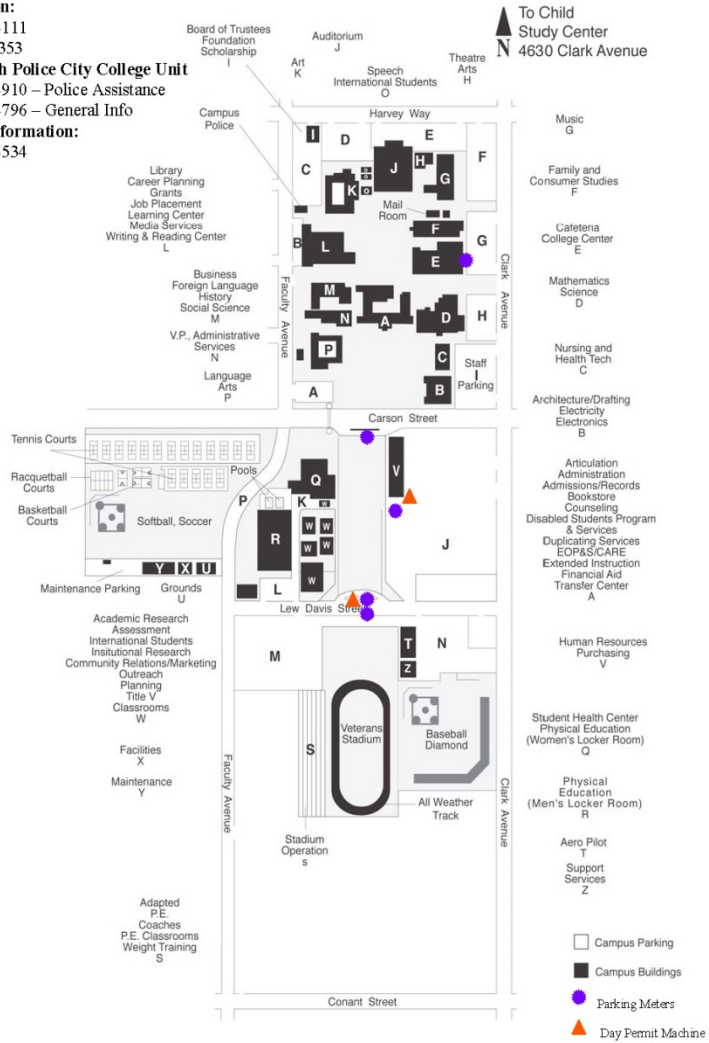
