

Mission

Center for a Competitive Workforce (CCW) was established in 2017 as a Strong Workforce Program regional project of the 19 community colleges in the Los Angeles region in collaboration with the LA/OC Center of Excellence for Labor Market Research (COE) hosted at Mt. San Antonio College and the Los Angeles County Economic Development Corporation (LAEDC).

In partnership with the COE and LAEDC Institute for Applied Economics, CCW has published multiple labor market reports that analyze labor supply and demand data for middle-skill occupations in high-growth industries to inform and influence the development of new or modified career education and workforce development programs and curricula. CCW supports quarterly convenings with education, workforce,nonprofit, government and industry leaders in three of the LA region's most highly concentrated and fastest growing industry sectors of advanced transportation, bioscience and digital media/entertainment, with the co-equal goals to strengthen industry engagement with community college faculty and to connect more community college students to meaningful work-based learning opportunities, as one of the best ways to constructively prepare them for the 21st century jobs and careers in the fast-emerging and rapidly-changing knowledge-intensive industries that will drive our regional economy today and tomorrow.

CCW, in partnership with the regional directors for employer engagement, is piloting seven regional advisory committees to further strengthen regional alignment of and ongoing connections between faculty and industry. CCW has developed two online platforms: a biosciences industry portal and a regional Workforce and Education Partner Portal that employs technology to increase the speed and richness of industry-college connections, to seamlessly access and deploy the economic intelligence gleaned through industry engagement, and to rapidly expand and scale the number of workbased learning and employment opportunities for career education students and graduates with certificates and degrees.

INDUSTRY REPRESENTATION

Avin Sharma, Director of Labor Relations & Workforce Development, Port of Los Angeles



Avin joined the Port after having served in President Barack Obama's Administration as White House Liaison and Counselor to U.S. Secretary of Labor Tom Perez. In his role at the Port he is responsible for engaging and maintaining relationships with labor unions and leading the Port's efforts to develop initiatives that support workforce development in the goods movement sector across Southern California. In January 2020, Governor Gavin Newsom appointed Avin as a board member of the California Workforce Development Board, responsible for the oversight and continuous improvement of the workforce system in California. From the Fall 2020 through January 2021, he served as the lead for the US Department of Labor

on the Biden-Harris Presidential Transition Team.

Amber Meshack, Director, Business, Jobs & Social Responsibility Division, Los Angeles World Airports (LAWA)



Amber Meshack is the Director of the Business, Jobs, & Social Responsibility (BJSR) Division at Los Angeles World Airports (LAWA). As Director of the BJSR Division, Ms. Meshack is responsible for workforce and business opportunity programs including ensuring delivery of inclusivity commitments for the \$14B LAWA capital program, overseeing LAWA'S First Source Hiring Program, managing the small contractor development and bonding assistance program, and developing strategic partnerships for business and workforce development. Prior to taking on the role of BJSR Director, Ms. Meshack worked on the LAX Landside Access Modernization Program (LAMP), where she managed executive operations and procurements, including for the City's

largest ever public-private-partnership project, the \$4.9B Automated People Mover, the largest contract ever entered into by the City of Los Angeles. As part of that effort, Ms. Meshack was responsible for developing the local hire, workforce, and small, local, and disadvantaged business contracting requirements. Before coming to LAX, Ms. Meshack helped to establish the City of Los Angeles Neighborhood Council system and was an organizer with the Los Angeles Alliance for a New Economy, "the living wage coalition", helping to establish local livable wages.

LACBFFA collaborates with government, carriers, industry and one another. Licensed U.S. Customs Brokers and Freight Forwarders are responsible for facilitating goods moving through the Ports of LA/Long Beach and LAX. Education is a major cornerstone of the LACBFFA. We offer Scholarships to our Customs Brokers Exam Preparation Course in the spring and fall. Former

LACBFFA President, Norman Harris, has taught the course since 2009 and has educated more than 800 individuals of which 100 have earned their Customs Broker License, allowing them to elevate their career paths. In addition, LACBFFA holds monthly programs relating to Customs and Border Protection and some of the over 40 partner government agencies (PGA's) involved in regulating trade. 




TRADE AND LOGISTICS DEMAND DATA




Two community college programs have historically prepared students for careers involved in the global supply chain:

LA International Business and Trade Programs











By completing the degree or certificate requirements, the student will gain proficiency in safety practices, automotive service, testing, troubleshooting, brakes, suspension, wheel alignment, engine tune-up, electrical systems, fuel systems (carburetion and fuel injection), emission systems, transmissions, drive trains, engine repair, engine rebuilding, automotive machining, or air conditioning. A student completing degree or certificate requirements may expect to enter industry as a technician in automotive service, repair, tune-up, smog certification, or automotive air conditioning.
