

First off, a huge thank you to everyone who has been a part of this production and helped bring it to life. This show was surrounded by a dream team of designers consisting of faculty and students. On behalf of the entire LBCC Theatre Arts program and our SKM team, we'd like to extend a huge thank you to Dean Janét Hund, Paul Kaminski, Letty Totah and the entire LBCC Foundation Board for helping us obtain additional funding for this production. Your support helped provide amazing training and performance opportunities for our students that will resonate for the rest of their lives. Thank you for helping enrich their journey as artists. What a joy to see the Mission Statement of this college be embraced and contribute to bringing this production to life.

Back in 2014 I had the opportunity to be a part of a staged reading of She Kills Monsters at the LOFT Theatre Ensemble in Los Angeles when a colleague, the fight director of the West Coast Premiere of the show, asked me to read for the role of Chuck. This play, which debuted Off Broadway and quickly made its way to Steppenwolf Theatre in Chicago, was catching fire around the country and it soon seemed like every theater in the country was producing She Kills Monsters. I quickly learned why. Our reading was magical; everyone at that table was touched by this amazing story of a young woman who, struggling to overcome the grief caused by the loss of her entire family, found a way to connect with a community of which she'd never dreamed being a part. The play was full of rich theatrical convention: stage combat, puppetry and dancing. More importantly it was full of heart, joy and laughter.

Now having been a part of this show in some capacity (usually as a fight director) for the past eight years, the magic continues to grow for me and for audiences around the world. Last year Concord Theatricals released a video online, celebrating the ten-year anniversary of this play. Since its publishing, She Kills Monsters is the most produced piece of theatre in academic institutions around the world. From familial struggles, traumatic loss of loved ones, to discovering and embracing your sexuality and bullying, Qui brilliantly encapsulates the struggles of a young woman who is attempting to overcome the overwhelming grief of losing a sibling (and her entire family).

In this story, Agnes finds Tilly's (her sister) notebook, which contains a homebrew Dungeons and Dragons (D&D) module that Tilly created. Agnes plays the module as part of her grieving process. I was not surprised to discover that therapists use D&D (and other Table Top Role-Playing Games/TTRPGs) to aid patients and provide a safe space to explore a myriad of challenges they face in their daily life. From trauma to exploring identity, Table Top Role-Playing Games helps individuals have a chance to safely explore and address these challenges while creating a sense of empowerment. For the last ten years, Dungeons and Dragons has certainly become more mainstream and is now a major part of our culture. The power of TTRPGs to create community and forge safe spaces where we can share adventures, snacks, drinks and a ton of laughs will always be a sacred place. I look forward to rejoining my own D&D party soon (shout out to The Wild Bunch). For now, let us assemble the dice tray, blow on that lucky D20 and venture forth on our own quest. Thank you for joining us this evening, we hope you enjoy the show.

GLOSSARY OF SKM TERMS -

(IN ORDER OF APPEARANCE IN SHE KILLS MONSTERS)

DND OR D&D

Dungeons and Dragons, a multiplayer fantasy role playing game created in 1974, played using a set of dice and guided by a Dungeon Master. By the time of this play, DnD was in its 2nd edition. (Now in the 5th ed.)

RPG

Role Playing Game

NERD OR GEEK

A person who is extremely knowledgeable, obsessive, and enthusiastic about a particular subject or niche interest

KOBALD

Lizard-like monster in DnD; challenge level 1

JEDI-JITSU

Oh, come on, Chuck! You made that one up!

56 KILOBITS PER SECOND

Common internet speed in 1995; current high-speed internet is 100-500 megabits per second, about 10,000 times faster!

PALADIN

A Paladin swears to uphold justice and fight forces of evil. They have the power to heal injuries. A noble character.

HOMESPUN MODULE

A blueprint or plan for a DnD adventure that was written by a player or dungeon master (not written by TSR, the game company).

DM

Dungeon Master; the individual who runs a game. The DM also determines disputes in the game and voices and rolls for NPCs (Non-player characters)

NOOB

Same as "new-bie" - a player new to the game

ALIGNMENT

A character's moral characteristics: good, evil, lawful, unlawful, chaotic

STAFF OF SUH

A powerful staff that belongs to Orcus

WICKED

As used in the play, this is a modifier for words. It means "very" or "really." As in "wicked good" which means very good.

TV/VCR

A combination of a television and a machine that plays videotapes which was popular in households of the 1990s.

STD

Sexually Transmitted Disease

MRS. ROBINSON

A reference from the film, The Graduate. Refers to an older woman who seduces younger men.

CRITICAL ROLL

When a DnD player rolls 20 on a 20-sided die (a D20), even the most unlikely outcome become possible.

BUG BEARS

Very large muscular goblin-like monster who loves to create terror in their victims. They live in caves, are greedy, and love shiny objects & weapons.

MAGE

A DnD character who studies and performs spells but has less durability than other characters; often a target during battles.

SUCCUBUS

Immortal evil humanoid demon; incredibly beautiful with black wings; has draining kiss; delight in causing suffering

D20

A 20 sided die which is rolled to determine outcome of a move.

20TH LEVEL

Top level character in DnD where players are like gods. Rare for a player to get to that level.

GELATINOUS CUBE

A transparent mindless monster, roughly a 10 foot cube. Swallows anyone or anything in its path and digests them with acid

DOPPELGANGER

Literally means "double-goer" in German. In DnD, a doppelganger is a shapeshifter. They are lazy but clever. They assume the shape of creatures they kill.

BEHOLDER

A large round floating monster with one large eye, a fanged mouth, and multiple tentacles with eyes on the ends. They are arrogant and paranoid.

TIAMAT

Deity-level, large, evil five-headed dragon; Queen of the Dragons; one of the most difficult monsters to kill in DnD since it has regeneration powers.
