

DIRECTOR'S NOTES

Machinal is a 1928 play by American playwright and journalist Sophie Treadwell, inspired by the real-life case of convicted and executed murderer Ruth Snyder. Treadwell avoided naturalism in her storytelling in favor of an Expressionist style, which utilizes theatrical elements of exaggeration and distortion to deliver strong feelings and ideas to audiences. Expressionism shifts emphasis from the text of the script to the physical performance, creating a character's "inner world" that is expressed outwardly in unconventional ways.

In this play, a young woman trapped by the conventions and machinations of the societal roles thrust upon her sees the world through a filter of anxiety and hopelessness, which is reflected in the acting style, staging, and technical design of each of the nine episodes. In almost every instance the Young Woman is seeking a method of escape. Few of the characters are referred to by name, but rather by their function. Ultimately the Young Woman is not in control of her own fate. Rather, her destiny is determined by others and the demands of the societal machine that she struggles against.

Theatre is a collaborative art, and the contributions of the designers, crew, and performers have been a major influence in shaping this performance. The physical expression you see onstage was created by the actors, who not only created their own movements but also had a hand in teaching and shaping the physical expression of others. This collaboration has been uniquely satisfying, and despite the sometimes-bleak themes in the play, we managed to have our fair share of laughs. Since we are not dealing with conventional storytelling, we have chosen to throw out many of the "rules" and express our creativity through the visceral and visual elements that shape this story. Thank you to all who contributed, and to the audience for taking this ride with us.
